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A BRIEF HISTORY OF PANMURE WHARF RESERVE, KINGS ROAD, PANMURE

Compiled by Panmure Historical Society Inc. 2015

- ❖ Original Wharf built by Fencibles of Panmure, 1848-1850
- ❖ Original Wharf replaced by new wharf in 1890's by Panmure Township Roads Board
- ❖ Wharf bought by MacCullum Brothers in 1926. Contested by Council 1955
- ❖ Ownership was eventually established by A.W. Bryant in 1962
- ❖ Wharf purchased by Mt Wellington Borough Council, for further use solely as a recreational facility in 1968
- ❖ Five years later in 1972 steps and landing added to wharf for ferry service between Waiheke Island and Panmure
- ❖ Tamaki City Council taken over by Auckland City Council 1989 – 2010, Auckland Council current wharf falls into disrepair as maintenance stops 1999-2014.

## Getting on with restoring Wai-o-Taiki Nature Reserve

09.11.2015

### Overview

Wai-o-Taiki Nature Reserve was established in 1977 by the local community with the support of the then Auckland City Council, Auckland Regional Council, Auckland Harbour Board and the Geographic Board of N.Z.

Requests to have the reserve developed, maintained and managed have fallen on deaf ears. (see copious amounts of correspondence)

It is now time for the community to review the 2013 concept plan and its impact on the reserve and surrounding Wai-o-Taiki Bay suburb.

The intent of the Wai-o-Taiki Nature Reserve is to have people experience a full bush nature walk i.e. within the bush and following the coastline. Hence, Wai-o-Taiki Nature Reserve.

## Goals

1. Protect the reserve by completing stage 2 of the erosion protection walls project. (ref 1994-95 works)
2. Renew the original walkways as planned and constructed in partnership with the local community since 1977.
3. Clean up sewage and stormwater in Omarau Stream portion of the reserve and develop a managed water outflow, groins and retaining where required, particularly at peak times. Improve the water quality test results by 3 places.
4. Set a plan for the development and maintenance of the reserve in conjunction with the local community.

## Specifications

A local Wai-o-Taiki Bay Residents and reserve committee is being formed and will be seeking the above goals are met by the Tamaki - Maungakiekie Community Board. (this group has convened in the past and 1. changed the name of the suburb & 2. ensured footpaths in the suburb were constructed in concrete).

Whilst the reserve is a nature reserve it host horses in neighbouring paddocks and cattle on the adjacent Pt. England Reserve. This is part of the niche nature of the reserve.

Since very little money has been spent of the infrastructure of the reserve over the last 10 years, a right and just amount needs to be set down to achieve the goals above. A compare and contrast regarding the current state of the Wai-o-Taiki Reserve in comparison to other local reserves and in particular the budget set down for the new park development in Onehunga puts the lack of attention and budget into perspective.

## Milestones

### I. LDI Monies

Immediately allocate the \$280,000, just arrived at the community board, to undertake the commencement of Erosion Walls (Stage 2)

Immediately direct the current renewal monies be allocated to the original walkway reconstruction and not be put elsewhere.

**Local Board-funded projects**

The Infrastructure and Environmental Services (I&ES) department has been allocated the Maungakiekie-Tāmaki Local Board budgets for Manukau Harbour and Tamaki Estuary Panmure Basin water quality improvements. The board also allocated \$10,000 to support community waste minimisation initiatives.

As the work programme supporting those budget lines was only agreed in October 2015, there is no progress update to report at this time. The table below is a reminder of the agreed work programme.

<b>Local Board budget line – Manukau Harbour water quality improvements</b>
<b>Manukau Harbour Forum (\$12,000)</b>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Year 2 of the Manukau Harbour Forum work programme is focused on further developing the communications programme to raise awareness of the Manukau, and the Manukau Harbour Forum.</li> <li>• The final flagship sites (funded through the 2014/2015 work programme) will be held in late September or early October at a freight forwarding company site. A full report back to the Forum on the programme is pending.</li> <li>• A symposium is planned for April or May next year. This symposium will bring together interested parties (including iwi, community representatives, Council staff and other experts) to discuss how to work together in planning for the future of the Manukau</li> <li>• A report was presented to the Forum at its October 2015 meeting outlining a proposed plan to undertake a feasibility study for hydrodynamic modelling of the Manukau.</li> </ul>
