Summary	<p>The most highly regarded service of the Blind Foundation is the library which has over 10,000 titles in its collection. Last year 4650 users of this free service borrowed 616,410 items. Feedback anecdotally and via the library user survey consistently shows a high demand for more New Zealand titles, more topical subjects and more recently published books in a wide variety of genres. Access to books is a lifeline for people who have lost their sight and now have much more unstructured time available due to their inability to continue with sport, arts and hobbies and potentially their former employment.</p>		
Requesting grant for	<p>To purchase new digital talking books for the Blind Foundation library to meet demand. This free service is the most highly rated of Blind Foundation services however consistent user feedback is that more recent titles and a wider selection of books are needed. Small contributions are sought from trusts, foundations and local authorities in all communities around the country to add to the national collection. Last year 4,650 users borrowed 616,410 items. Each book costs approximately \$500-1500 with multiple licences purchased to enable many copies to be issued concurrently and, once purchased, books are permanently in the collection.</p>
