Due to the increased size of the band, we no longer have appropriate stands to cater for every player and this has led to difficulties not only in rehearsals but at outdoor community performances in particular (for example ANZAC day).</p> <p>Our aim is to support our community musicians as best as we possibly can, ensuring we work toward continually growing the skill, ability and ultimate effectiveness of this community ensemble.</p>
