Clients told us there was not enough understanding of what blind people could achieve and there were not enough activities available specifically designed for people who are blind or have low vision. A recent needs assessment survey showed that 46.6% of clients felt that there were free-time activities or interests that they would like to do but can't due to their sight loss. It is vital that we eliminate those barriers and create accessible recreation and social activities. |
