Requesting grant for	We've already secured the funds to build one raised garden bed and want funding to build and plant a second. The challenge we have faced is that, in order to meet the needs of the students and the space we are putting the vegetable garden, the raised beds need to be higher than the normal one board high, hence why the building material costs might seem expensive. We've also purchased a compost bin, but need some additional money to be able to roll composting out across the school.
