Summary	<p>Hydrotherapy is proving extremely beneficial for people with MS and other neurological conditions, helping them manage the symptoms of their disease and keeping them active in the community.</p> <p>These classes are very popular - 247 attendees in 2015 - people with MS find it valuable for maintaining their health and slowing the progressive nature of this disease.</p> <p>We run these classes at the Manurewa Pool on Wednesday mornings. This venue is ideal as people with MS are very sensitive to temperature when exercising, so it is important to have a pool with water and ambient temperatures that enable people with MS not to feel too hot or cold. This pool also has a wheelchair hoist.</p>		
Cost of participation	Multiple Sclerosis Auckland charges \$5 per class. This is very heavily subsidised and the nominal charge is so participants assign value the programme they are attending		
Requesting grant for	Multiple Sclerosis Auckland is requesting funding of \$616 for the annual pool hire fee at the Manurewa Pool and Leisure Centre. The total annual cost to run this programme in the Manurewa local board area is \$7,816.30 including the neurological physiotherapist who facilitates the classes.
