<b>Summary</b>	<p>This grant is for the Outdoor cornerstone activities of the Scouting programme. The replacement of the tent poles will allow two of the three tents to be used again for the 2017 season. The purpose of the tents are for outdoor activities that regularly take place – Founder’s Day camp in February 2017, at least 6 Regattas each year and various other events. The tents are used by any youth who join the Scouting programme 5 to 18 years of age and their care givers/Leaders. These events develop their abilities in community leadership, a passion to achieve more and set their values to contribute to society. Each camp is joined by other youth groups who also have their own equipment.</p>		
<b>Cost of participation</b>	<p>Yes, there is a cost associated with camps to cover food, transport and grounds. The minimum amount is charged to cover costs to maximise youth participation. This grant supports this approach.</p>		
<b>Requesting grant for</b>	<p>The use of tents is an integral part of the Scouting programme. The communal sleeping builds tolerance and acceptance as part of activity’s team building. The funds are to partly cover two sets of 12” by 12” tent poles. This grant allows the cost of each camp to be minimised support maximum participation of youth members (the Scout Policy is not to exclude members due to financial reasons). The poles will add significantly more years of use to the tents than currently can’t be used and have multiple uses such as sun shade and gear security at other events.</p>
