<b>Summary</b>	<p>Morning Melodies is a series of monthly morning concerts at 11am which will feature young singers, musicians and pianists either in training or seeking more performing opportunities. This is a new initiative for Opera Factory and we hope to provide an opportunity to experience the performing arts, particularly for retirees and the elderly in the local areas who no longer feel comfortable attending evening performances and events. It also gives young musicians an opportunity to participate in the arts in the wider community and perform to new audiences. Each concert will have different performers and we may be able to take the opportunity to feature guest artists from time to time.</p>

<b>Cost of participation</b>	Yes the event is ticketed but with a reduced price of \$20. The funding application will be sought to cover the portion of costs not covered by expected ticket income.		
<b>Requesting grant for</b>	We are looking to find funding towards the fee for accompanists (pianists) for each session, the venue hire, project coordinator, piano tuning and some small costs for marketing and basic catering. This would be over a period seven months April - October. The funding would cover the portion of costs not fully covered by ticket sales, which are not a guaranteed number from concert to concert. We are budgeting on 20 tickets per concert, so there is a shortfall of \$1409.
