Acknowledgement that this is no longer just an issue for the city it exists in the suburbs. - Social Impact Fund – could this be used to help TSI with some of the work with prisoners and reintegration. - Childcare was also an inhibitor for a lot of women who wanted to retrain or seek employment. - Important to train more social intrapreneur’s to help people retrain and reintegrate back into employment.
