Summary	The Circle hires the Cinema for a monthly evening film session on the final Wednesday of every month since May, 2004. The Cinema subsidises the evening, but there is still a charge of \$75 per session which, if not funded, comes from the koha given on the evening. The films shown are from my personal subscription, for which I pay approximately \$550 per annum. This cost is my personal cost and is not reimbursed in any way. All koha each month is distributed to local groups and charities.

Summary	<p>This project involves one Attitude presenter visiting Waiheke High School in May 2017 to deliver 5 life skills presentations to approx. 430 students. The main objectives of the Attitude programme are to encourage mental & emotional resilience & help prevent youth suicide, teen pregnancy, drug & alcohol abuse & low self-esteem - some of the main issues NZ young people are struggling with. By talking about these topics Attitude empowers young people to make healthy decisions and equips them with strategies to deal with negative pressures. We want to see all young people enjoy great futures, so we proactively give them basic life-skills to build a robust self-esteem and encourage them to pursue strong connections with their families, peers and communities.</p>		
Cost of participation	If we are unable to fundraise for all costs we ask schools to donate a koha for our presentations, though as schools budgets are limited this is not always possible.		
Requesting grant for	If successful this grant will be used towards the cost of delivering 5 life skills and mental health presentations to Waiheke High School students @ \$200 each, one return ferry ticket for our presenter - \$20.00, and provide Year 10 students with a copy of our Hardwired handbook (drug and alcohol education) @ \$1.38 each.

The Attitude programme develops young people by teaching them how to make good decisions and inspiring them to implement these decisions. Through our range of presentations and resources we teach young people how to engage with and solve problems, how to cultivate healthy self-esteem and good mental health, how to recover from setbacks and how to understand and improve relationships. With good emotional and resilience skills, they are far less likely to fall into substance abuse, self-harm and destructive relationships.</p>
