<b>Summary</b>	The proposal is to extend the band room by approximately 50%, enabling all members to comfortably fit in for rehearsals and to include a separate space for teaching.		
<b>Requesting grant for</b>	Building work and associated building consent and architect costs.

<b>Active participants</b>	N/A	<b>Audience size</b>	5000 approx. across all events over a year, though no people will be involved in the building project.
<b>Promotion</b>	No -		
<b>Local board recognition</b>	Local board members will be invited to various events which the band partakes in. However, the main means of acknowledging the Local Board will be through the use of their logo on the band's website and in advertising materials and concert programmes. Signage could also be placed on or inside the band room.		
<b>Reason for the project</b>	The three bands under the Kumeu Brass umbrella - Vintage Brass (mostly-retired men & women) which has seen large growth in numbers recently; Kumeu Brass and Evolution Brass (the junior band). Vintage Brass is unable to all fit into the room to rehearse. On occasion when the bands wish to rehearse together, this is entirely impossible. There is clearly a need for a brass band in the northwest of Auckland, as evidenced by the number of occasions upon which the various bands are asked to perform within the community. Please see the separate file on work undertaken by the bands during 2016.		
<b>Community benefit</b>	The band room extension will benefit the three bands, by enabling them to continue to thrive, and to continue to serve the community. The extension will also make it much more viable to teach more than one learner at a time. The completion of the building project will be immediately apparent, but the primary driver is the long-term benefits and the bands' ability to continue to involve as many people as possible in their activities. The bands perform an important civic function not only in Kumeu, but in the surrounding areas of Hobsonville, Henderson, Massey, Swanson and Helensville.
