<b>Summary</b>	<p>Odyssey Café is a social enterprise training café, open to the public for nutritious, homemade food and coffee. Through the café we run a training programme for young people aged 16-24. Trainees are referred both from within Odyssey (who are young people receiving support for alcohol and drug addiction) and from various local partner organisations, who support vulnerable or 'at risk' young people. The programme runs for eight weeks, trainees receiving one-on-one training for 10-12 hours per week. Young people gain on-the-job experience and work towards NZQA Unit Standards in food safety, coffee making and customer service. Café trainees also receive support to attain sustainable employment.</p>		
<b>Requesting grant for</b>	<p>We are seeking funding to cover the New Zealand Qualifications Authority Reporting Fee and training material/administration costs charged by our Industry Training Organisation, Service IQ. In addition, we are seeking funding to cover the cost of trainee uniforms, Odyssey Café-branded t-shirts and aprons for trainees to wear during café shifts. Our aim in the long-term is for the café to be financially sustainable through café sales revenue and in a position to support the training programme operations. However we are currently in the start-up phase of business development and so are seeking funding to cover these training programme costs.</p>
