Reason for the project	Of our 40 halogen spotlights, 20 are now unserviceable and unrepairable as parts are no longer available. Tungsten floodlights are also severely compromised due to the number of power surges experienced on Waiheke. It is common for all floodlight bulbs to blow in a power surge. Currently each exhibition is a challenge to cover with lighting. We are able to use existing tracks, it is just the fittings that need replacement		
Community benefit	The Gallery has been under lit now in parts for over a year. Lack of lighting creates a dark look and does not adequately light artworks to their best advantage. Better lighting technology is essential to the operation of the Gallery if it is to continue to present high quality exhibitions and events to both the people of Waiheke and visitors to the Island. Once we have new technology lighting we will be able to use it more creatively. Artworks will all be fully lit, resulting in satisfied artists, compliments received in visitors' book, and less need for ongoing maintenance

An essential component of the Gallery is the availability of quality lighting in which to present artworks. All our events are aligned with the Waiheke Local Board Plan priorities, including to develop and support local events that are locally specific and environmentally responsible.</p>

Summary	<p>We wish to build three bridges over sections of Katoa Iwi (family track) where the drainage is insufficient. This has three purposes - rider safety, more efficient maintenance long term (currently we have to re-surface these sections regularly which is costly in terms of time and money), and the opportunity for increased skills (riding structures is a vital skill in mountain biking). In addition we require more signage to ensure that the trail network is comprehensible, that trail directions are clear, and that each trail is named. This is important for safety (so riders do not come in opposite directions), and ease of use of the network, which is currently quite confusing due to the lack of adequate signage.</p>

Reason for the project	<p>The drainage problem has been ongoing - in the winter the trail becomes unrideable for safety reasons. We have tried to rectify the situation with different surfacing but the moisture returns and the sections subside.</p> <p>The need for additional signage has been established through feedback from local and visiting riders who find the trail network confusing to navigate. Also the need for directional signage is a safety issue - ambiguity around which direction trails are meant to be ridden can end in accidents.</p>		
Community benefit	Our trail network is a popular one for mountain bikers on the island. Increasingly, as more trails have been built by the club, OSP is becoming a destination for visiting riders too. By continually improving and upgrading the trails we will attract even more riders both to Waiheke and to the awesome sport of mountain-biking. Our trails are an asset to the island, and were all built by volunteers. We feel that improving them thus enhances this community resource.
