We also plan to bring an inspirational Māori male leader who will stimulate and electrify the audience with an inspirational oration or performance. The purpose of this is to celebrate and reinforce the transformative power of a positive Māori male role model in the health and well-being of whānau Māori. It is vitally important for older and younger generations to share stories, to inspire each other, and fundamentally to challenge common misconceptions of the Māori male archetype. We want our young men to flourish, to be caring, sensitive, and confident and resilient.</p>

This will be done by celebrating the achievements of Māori men, particularly in the context of caring, nurturing and flourishing environments. Te reo Māori will be the main medium of instruction as is normal within the Kura environment. Tikanga will govern correct and proper processes and protocols during the event.
