<b>Summary:</b>	This weekend brings together people of all ages, from all over New Zealand, who share a love of concert band music. It gives people a chance to experience working with a different conductor, try music that perhaps their local band doesn't have the instruments or experience to tackle, and build a wider network within the New Zealand concert band scene. Encouragement, success, musical development, and friendship are the key objectives. The usually-annual weekend is hosted in a different town/city each time, and is attended by people from Kerikeri to Whakatane to New Plymouth. We then put on a concert for the local community, to entertain and promote concert band music.

### Community benefits

#### Identified community outcomes:

This weekend brings together community musicians from around the country. Some people come from small towns with tiny bands; they go home with a new energy, and we often then see their bands at the NZCBA Festival. Younger musicians are given confidence, and having met other young musicians, are more inclined to audition for the NZ Youth Symphonic Winds (another NZCBA initiative). Our more senior musicians are welcomed and supported whatever their needs, physical or financial, as the Band Weekend has evolved from a specifically "Seniors Band". Our final concert gives the local community an opportunity to experience concert band music (entry by koha).

We collect information on enrolment about the bands that participants belong to. This lets us track later NZCBA Festival participation. We record audience numbers, though this of course depends on the location.

## Community benefits

### Identified community outcomes:

Our collective supports women and minorities in film. We received a QR fund to renew our brand for the collective and we will launch this at the event in Auckland central. The event will screen films by women filmmakers and music by women led bands. It will be attended by both new and seasoned filmmakers plus people from the media and politics (Metiria Turei is our key speaker). The event is to launch our fundraising campaign for the crux of the film budget. The film itself is aimed at various ethnic communities in Auckland and utilizes actors from those groups including Middle Eastern and Samoan communities. We will premiere the film in Auckland and include Auckland council in our promotions.

The screenplay was already shortlisted by the NZ Film Commission and has currently had extensive help from the community including free casting services from Catch Casting and script consulting from producer Ainsley Gardiner (Boy, Eagle vs Shark). Our crew and cast are all Auckland central based and from different ethnic backgrounds which will be shown onscreen within the narrative. The film will be shot in Auckland central. It is a migrant story told from a migrant point of view. The aim is to be accepted into the NZ International Film Festival in 2018 for the premiere and then to branch out internationally in film festivals.

To Hold performing arts full day workshops throughout New Zealand on auditioning technique, in singing, acting and dancing, Choreographing jazz and tap pieces, acting classes with monologues and group classical acting techniques and methods from Shakespeare, Brecht, Meisner, Ibsen, Stanislavski, Chekhov, Pinter and Arthur Miller. To provide affordable, after hours appointments for this client group is critically important.

We measure the success and outcomes of our work with evaluations and written feedback by the very people who attend counselling sessions. We receive client feedback being a) how helpful they find counselling, b) what they value about the way counsellors work with them, c) the impact counselling has had in their lives d) what has changed or improved for them as a result of counselling and e) if they can share any significant outcomes as a result of attending counselling.
