### Community benefits

#### Identified community outcomes:

People with disabilities often say that the biggest issue they have in public is being ignored, or made to feel invisible. Our internal audit conducted in 2013 showed that 94% of respondents felt that, with a Mobility Dog as a companion, there was an increase in social response to them as individuals when in public. We also found that 67% of respondents found that they had increased their own participation in social activities. While increases in feelings of independence (94%), confidence (78%), and emotional and mental well-being (83%) are also all very important, the role a Mobility Dog plays in the social and community life of an individual is profoundly important.

Benefits of Mobility Dogs include individuals with physical disabilities who have requested a Mobility Dog; and also the dedicated prisoners of Auckland Women's Correction Facility in Wiri (and by extension their families), who participate in our Puppies in Prison Programme. The Programme is yielding positive effects like a safer and connected community by giving prisoners a chance to improve their education and social skills through caring for, and training a Mobility Dog. This, in turn, has positive effects for the children and families of prisoners as the skills the prisoners learn intuitively translate into their home and community environments.
