We have chevron skinks on our property. We also have breeding Kukupa and tom tits. During the early 2000's DOC ran a rat trapping project on our property and DOC land where chevron skink were found. Monitoring was also carried out on the site. We, my husband and I were involved in the rat trapping. We have since the project finished rat trap around our residential site as we have the threatened skinks and birds around our house. We also try to keep noxious weeds off the land.

#### Identified community outcomes:

Our property (62 ha) is situated in Kaiaraara Bay. We have been privately rat trapping around our immediate living area since 2001 and now want to expand our operation to a wider area on our property. On 3 sides of our property borders onto the DOC estate. There are areas of pest management throughout the island and look forward to being able to close the gaps towards a pest free island.

The 2000 NZ Biodiversity Strategy called for willing committed landowners to help halt the loss of NZs biodiversity - that's us. Of the 28,000HA that make up Great Barrier, only about 1,500HA has any kind of pest management focused on sustaining the islands biodiversity. Active protection is essential if we are to hold the native species we have - hence the Battle for Our Birds so strongly recommended in the recent Commissioner for the Environments Report. Our monitoring shows the huge differences of abundance of species between managed and unmanaged land.

#### Identified community outcomes:

It is important to have local working models of conservation that engage and inform the local community about the benefits of ecological restoration through pest suppression.

There are huge community benefits socially and economically from this project that sit alongside the tangible conservation outcomes we report to the community.

The science that is carried out in the Sanctuary is well reported and assists the community gain locally based knowledge about equipment, pest management methods, and the pros and cons of relevant issues.



The Trust assists other landowners and mentors a number of local conservation initiatives. Having a list of neighbour's keen to join into the Sanctuary is an indication of how positively it is seen.

We are changing community expectations and attitudes to conservation through publicity and engagement with community over a long time.

species monitoring, community based research, and threatened species protection. This Sanctuary is

### Identified need:

Kākāriki were once widespread throughout New Zealand but today the species is rare on the mainland and common only on offshore islands free of mammalian predators. The number of kākāriki in Okiwi is unknown. Kākāriki are regularly sighted in the Okiwi River and adjacent forested areas. Kākāriki spend several days on the forest floor once they fledge, where they are at risk of predation by cats. Rats can predate eggs and chicks in nesting holes and chicks are also known to die from disease in the nest. Clutches of up to seven are common in areas with predator control. Yes

### Identified community outcomes:

Despite cat and rat predation kākāriki have held on in Okiwi, which could indicate a relative abundance of favourable nest sites and food sources. With pest control, this part of Aotea/Great Barrier has the potential to become another stronghold for these birds.

Strong community support from Okiwi residents and landowners exists for setting up a pest control network in Okiwi, which this project and the separately funded private landowner Okiwi River rat trapping project can be viewed as 'pilots' ie trialling how a wider, more comprehensive predator programme could occur in Okiwi. This project has the support of DOC and several landowners and discussions are ongoing with the Council and Okiwi school. It is a great example of a project which could involve a whole community to achieve very visible biodiversity outcomes.
