Project: Heavy Hitters Programme

Location:	The primary facility is 4/9 Brigade Road, Mangere, Auckland. Other locations will also be utilised during the course of the programme.		
Summary:	This project will run on an on-going basis and is designed to target the obesity health issues in the local community. It consists of a variety of exercises in a fun yet controlled environment supervised by qualified CrossFit coaches. It is designed for approximately 30 people to ensure that each participant is given the same amount of coaching throughout the session. However, I will allow the numbers to increase and accept any individual who is committed to put in the effort during the sessions. Each session will be different to ensure variation and performed at high intensity according to the ability of each participant.

People delivering:	There will be four people directly involved in the delivery of the project. However this will be determined on the amount of people that show up at the training session.	People reached:	This project is capped at 30 people for each session to ensure each participant receives the same amount of coaching.
Promotion:	Not stated I started this project in late June 2017 via word of mouth starting from members of my CrossFit business. To date this has attracted approximately 8-10 people. I plan to create a Facebook page to get the word out in the community and potentially a website. Another option is to contact my local G.P and request referrals of patients keen to exercise in a fun and controlled environment who fit the criteria.		

Community benefits

Identified need:

There is a growing need for projects like this in the community as South Auckland has the highest obesity rate amongst Polynesian and Maori people. This fitness programme will teach the participant the proper technique and points of performance when performing exercises, the scaling option for the exercises and the basics of nutrition. Knowing these fundamentals will enhance their ability reduce obesity and allow them to share their knowledge with family members, friends or others affected by this health issue.

Identified community outcomes:

The community outcomes of the project will consist of the following;

- Increased opportunities for active living and community involvement and connectedness;

The programme is designed to target the obesity health issue through regular exercise and healthy eating. Through hard work and commitment, all participants will be equipped with the basic knowledge around performing exercises correctly and healthy eating. Furthermore, this knowledge

can be passed on to family members, friends or associates affected by this health issue. The ideal situation is to hear or see some participants start their own training routines with the knowledge attained from the programme.

The programme will bring together people of diverse backgrounds and encourage each other to branch out and meet new people. Expanding their network base and form friendly relationships where they can continue their fitness journey outside of the programme.

- Increased multi-use community and recreational facilities;

Introducing the participants to the free council facilities such as the swimming pools and making them aware of the importance of survival skills around water. There is a need for water safety and swimming lessons for our local people and to introduce a basic programme to get them in the water is a start.

The primary aim of the project is to help reduce the obesity health issue in our local community through a variation of exercises and the basics on nutrition. This promotes active and healthy living which will not only benefit the participant but also other potential participants and the public health system. The project offers variation which utilises the local parks / reserves and swimming pools. This will create exposure to these places and encourage the participants to use these facilities more often outside of the project sessions with their families.

Identified need:

Youthline has been providing support to Auckland young people since 1970. Our services continue to be in demand. In 2016 alone, approximately 25,000 people used the South Auckland community Centre. In 2016 Youthline youth workers worked individually with 933 South Auckland youth (mentoring and assisting them to successfully transition into adulthood) and delivered leadership and development programmes in 32 schools. 518 face to face counselling sessions were delivered and 388 individual mentoring sessions where young people had one to one support.

Identified need:

- Current research shows that 1 in 75 children are diagnosed with autism (ASD) and/or communication related disorders
- Parents/caregivers, preschool teachers and community providers are requesting programmes to support them with their children with ASD and to join together with other parents who are struggling to cope.
- This is needed because children with ASD and communication disorders demonstrate fairly early no desire to communicate beyond using strategies that meet their needs. It is part of the social communication impairment they endure.
- Currently children with these disadvantages are funded to be assessed for impairment but then whanau are not provided with the tools to effectively communicate with them

Identified community outcomes:

1. We are the only provider in Auckland that offers Early Bird at no cost to families. We have self-funded the additional cost to run four programmes in 2016-2017 per year but self-funding the programmes has become unsustainable with the increased demand on our services and

programmes. This funding will assist us to deliver this much needed support for 2017-18.

2. Parents/caregivers who are struggling to communicate with their children with ASD will be provided with strategies and support to cope more effectively on a day-to-day basis.

3. Whanau will experience positive community engagement and be empowered to overcome the stigma they feel and join in with other community activities provided at the community centre.

In addition participants (i.e. parents, whanau, caregivers, educators and other relevant community people) and their children who attend the programme come from local communities in the area where the programme is delivered. Many of the participants come from socially, economically and culturally disadvantaged backgrounds, the majority being Maori and Pacifica. The cost savings for communities is that these children will later contribute in more meaningful ways

Of these 42 workshops were held in the Mangere-Otahuhu area involving 384 participants. Feedback is always very positive and without exception the schools would have us back.

We carry out annual surveys of members and record the amount of loans requested per city. Last year's library user survey showed that although the service is the most highly rated of all Blind Foundation services, a wider and more current range of titles is needed.

Identified community outcomes:

Local public libraries cannot cater to the low or no vision public and the different formats that are required so the Blind Foundation library plays a critical role in education and supporting development in literacy, reading and learning. People who lose their sight also lose options when it comes to participating in former recreation, work and socialisation activities so are prone to experiencing feelings of disempowerment and isolation. Consequently with much more free time and less to fill it, talking books fill a large gap and many library users are voracious "readers".
