Community benefits

Identified need:

We established the need via a community consultation meeting in 2016. The community, especially the Maori community wanted the Kura to be more inclusive and acknowledge the diversity of the kura which is now more apparent at Reremoana school. Our students come from a much wider diversity of various cultures and the community wants to see the establishment of a Kapahaka group. This has been formed and the Tamariki have performed, but we feel that Kapahaka costumes would further enhance the esteem of our students and will help to acknowledge the groups place within the school and the wider community.

Identified community outcomes:

The community outcomes will be that we, as a school will be :

- Able to enhance our schools wider profile within the local and wider community. As Reremoana School is very much into listening to our community.
- We will openly recognise our commitment to their requests and continue to enhance the work that we have already done to meet or charter goals and our commitment to the treaty o te Waitangi as is required by the Ministry of Education.
- Our tamariki will be seen as role models in the school.
- Having the costumes will enable the Tamariki to perform their talent in front of their peers, as well as the wider community and will enable them to perform with other groups with their heads held high in their own costumes that represent our school and its individuality. At the moment we have nothing. The students feel like others perceive it as just a club that they do every Friday. However, the group, have taken on Te Reo, protocols, Values, Performing Arts, Leadership roles, all that they were not able to do through the main stream of the school as more senior students have those roles.

Identified need:

We have gauged interest from local schools in the Auckland region, including Pt England, Papakura, Glendowie schools whom all said they are lacking professional dance workshops and opportunities for students to understand and experience the benefits of dance. We are particularly interested in targeting low decile schools, and reaching out to as many schools in the Auckland region as possible. We had have previous experience at delivering free workshops and performances at Pt England and Glenbrae School, and received incredible praise on the power of delivery of highly engaging contemporary dance and breaking down the cost barrier to experience such performances and workshops. Many schools simply cannot afford to pay for the cost of performances and workshops without your support.

Identified community outcomes:

This funding will go towards the direct delivery costs, which includes dancers salaries, artistic teams salaries, transport to the schools and rehearsal space hire. The

cost to run the Company each week is \$28,000.

Any amount would be helpful in the costs of delivering our workshops and performances to local schools. We would like to keep the costs to schools minimal or free of cost in order to make our work accessible to all. Each performance and workshop delivery takes a day of the company's time to deliver, plus approximately one week of management time to liaise and plan.

Cost of participation: \$5 per head for the performance, and \$250 for the workshop. But we vary this cost dependant on the schools finances-, and often provide free performances if the schools arts budget is minimal - frequently the case.

Sadly thru our food parcel operation we see on a daily basis, families in genuine need for food for their families. Our experience is backed up by the Salvation Army annual report showing how dire the situation is for many families particularly in South Auckland

Bad financial choices are usually as a result of poor education around financial literacy and the implications of these choices long term.

Even though we require our food parcel recipients to attend budgeting, we have observed that they get limited financial literacy/capability education. Our programs are designed to complement this with practical techniques to live within their budget set by their budgeter and targets the whole family to educate the children as well as the parents.

Identified community outcomes:

Thru our 3 step holistic approach we meet an immediate need of Food thru our food parcel program, we address the reason most food parcels are needed, this is usually a dire financial situation the family are in, this is done thru partnerships we have with budgeting organisations. And finally we educate thru our Financial Capability Courses we run. These courses are for both parents and children. Parents work thru a workbook designed by Massey University.

Thru our 3 step program, Parents are able to feed their children and themselves, the families cash flow is improved thru budgeting, Financial wellbeing is in initial stages of happening, Parents are given the support and confidence that they will be able to provide and support their families. Self-esteem, wellbeing and less stress for families. Security knowing they are not about to be evicted from their home. School attendance is improved; there is strong evidence available that shows children's attendance at school improving because parents are able to send children to school with breakfast & lunch. Parents are educated to make good financial decisions. The Community also

benefits when the family unit is strengthened.

Aphasia is more common than Parkinson's disease affecting one in three people who have a stroke. In Auckland 2 or 3 people acquire aphasia every day just from stroke. We do not know the true extent of aphasia because statistics for head injury and brain tumour acquired aphasia are not collated. Evidence-based analysis estimates at least 10,000 Aucklanders currently live with aphasia.

Aphasia can affect anyone of any age. While aphasia often affects older people, there has been a marked increase in younger people with stroke and aphasia.

People affected by aphasia struggle in our communities because of a lack of awareness, as well as assumptions made about their communication difficulties, and AphasiaNZ was founded because of these unmet needs.

Community benefits

Identified need:

Based in Manurewa, Te Whakaora focuses on serving the most at-risk individuals in our community, where according to Treasury 25% of children are at high-risk of having poor future outcomes, one of the highest rates in New Zealand. Our clients struggle with complex issues, including depression, drug addictions, and intergenerational welfare dependency. 84% of our clients are unemployed. Over 90% of our clients have more than three children, and many have had, or are at-risk of having their children removed by Oranga Tamariki.

Te Whakaora Tangata's programmes specifically target and address the root causes associated with these issues with outstanding results bringing greater safety, stability, and opportunity to the children involved.

Identified community outcomes:

In the short to mid-term, we expect to see positive changes in our client's:

- Physical health
- Mental health

- Family relationships
- Financial stress, and material hardship.

Also an increase in our client's protective factors including:

- Emotional health and connectedness (partner to partner; parent to child)

And Manurewa will:

- Be safer with decreased crime and anti-social behaviour
- Have an increase in work-ready candidates and improved work performance and stability
- Have less social burden on schools and social services
- Have reduced financial burden on the welfare system
- Have greater social inclusion of – and positive contribution from – families formally marginalised and isolated.

Based in Manurewa, our work improves the wellbeing of the most vulnerable whanau in our community. Each year 100-120 at-risk individuals attend our Family Restoration course, which is the gateway to our programme that RESTORES, RESOURCES, and RECONNECTS whanau empowering them to become RESILIENT.

Key outcomes of Te Whakaora's work are that the local community is made safer and more prosperous as our clients move away from criminal activity and violence into jobs and other activities that support and enhance the local community.

Te Whakaora Tangaata is about empowering marginalised parents so they can lead change in their own home and break the cycle of dysfunction for the next generation. 80% of our clients are Maori (many of whom are referred by the Manurewa Marae) and all our Whanau Coaches (1 male, 2 female) are maori graduates of our programme. Each are passionate about effecting change in their community.

Our name was gifted to the organisation by one of the Marae Kaumatua, and means "Life Restoration for the People". Our model of care is based on Te Whare Tapa Wha – the four cornerstones of Maori health.

Accessible to people with disabilities:

Yes - Our Family Restoration course and the Graduation are held at the Clendon Community House and the Manurewa Marae. Both spaces have disability access ramps and facilities. Our follow-up support is conducted by our Whanau coaches in clients' homes. Our team is passionate about restoring the most-vulnerable families in our community, and make every effort to ensure that those that most need our services are able to obtain them.

Target ethnic groups:

Māori, Pacific Peoples, Other: Our programme is suitable for all adults.

Promoting SmokeFree:

Our Family Restoration programme encourages and enables whanau to live active and healthy lives. Whanau that have completed the Family Restoration course, often make immediate changes that positively impact their health, such as giving up cigarettes, drugs, and other substance abuse. Also, a significant part of our on-going whanau support involves addressing issues such as addictions and budgeting concerns. Promoting a smoke-free lifestyle is a fundamental part of this process.

Currently our staff use foolscap ring binders and spend considerable time preparing and printing lesson plans and making folders. We print up to 500 pages per term per school which incurs a big stationery cost over the year. Besides the cost the time spent preparing each folder by our coordinator can be minimised and better used by spending it in the classroom supporting our Kiwi Can Leaders who deliver the lessons and the students. We want to shift away from paper to utilising technology as our schools are also heading that way.

Community benefits

Identified need:

Statistics NZ identifies one in five New Zealanders has a disability. In StarJam's age range (6 – 25 years), approximately 150,000 young people face barriers in their daily lives, especially the 52% (79,040) with learning disabilities.

StarJam is many attendees' only community outlet, offering acceptance, freedom from isolation, skills learning and socialising. We do not require disclosure of participants' disabilities, but know they have a range of physical, intellectual, sensory, learning, mental health/ emotional, speech and language disabilities.

Our workshops are mostly full, with some waiting lists. Regular inquiries express a need for our organisation.

Referrals from disability agencies (eg IDEAS services, Spectrum Care, Hohepa) recommend StarJam to their members.

Jammer, parent/caregiver feedback and surveys confirm the transformative impact of StarJam.

Identified community outcomes:

- 1) Strengthening Communities:
 - a. Workshops provide places of acceptance for vulnerable youth
 - b. Community performances promote inclusiveness; dispel preconceptions about the capabilities of disabled. They allow the Jammers (participants) to see themselves as valued, contributing members of the community.
 - c. Strengthens families through a network of support and respite for caregivers isolated by their child's disability.

2) Increase involvement of and opportunities for marginalised and minority groups:

StarJam offers freedom from marginalisation and isolation through lack of access to suitable community outlets by circumventing barriers:

- a) All disabilities accepted
- b) Wide age range (6 -25) accepted
- c) Choice of musical skills workshops offered

We do not:

We carry out annual surveys of members and record the amount of loans requested per city. Last year's library user survey showed that although the service is the most highly rated of all Blind Foundation services, a wider and more current range of titles is needed.

Identified community outcomes:

Local public libraries cannot cater to the low or no vision public and the different formats that are required so the Blind Foundation library plays a critical role in education and supporting development in literacy, reading and learning. People who lose their sight also lose options when it comes to participating in former recreation, work and socialisation activities so are prone to experiencing feelings of disempowerment and isolation. Consequently with much more free time and less to fill it, talking books fill a large gap and many library users are voracious "readers". The Library service is the most highly rated service by members, with a rapidly growing wish list.

215 blind or low vision residents live within the Manurewa Local Board area, with over 90% being over the age of 21. Summary:	This project will run on an on-going basis and is designed to target the obesity health issues in the local community. It consists of a variety of exercises in a fun yet controlled environment supervised by qualified CrossFit coaches. It is designed for approximately 30 people to ensure that each participant is given the same amount of coaching throughout the session. However, I will allow the numbers to increase and accept any individual who is committed to put in the effort during the sessions. Each session will be different to ensure variation and performed at high intensity according to the ability of each participant.

People delivering:	There will be four people directly involved in the delivery of the project and another 2 people involved with the water activities.	People reached:	This project is capped at 30 people; however I will take on participants if they are committed to the programme.
Promotion:	Not stated I am currently running some free training sessions targeting those who are deemed obese or overweight according to the Body Mass Index (BMI) chart. These sessions were advertised via word of mouth through current members of the gym and the attendance has ranged from 5 - 10 people. I plan to create a Facebook social media page to get the word out and potentially a website in due course. Another option is to collaborate with the local G.P doctor and request referrals of patients affected by this health issue and who are keen to give the programme a go.		

Community benefits

Identified need:

There is a growing need for projects like this in the community as South Auckland has the highest obesity rate amongst Polynesian and Maori people. This fitness programme will teach the participant the proper technique and points of performance when performing exercises, the scaling option for the exercises and the basics on nutrition. Knowing these fundamentals will enhance their ability to reduce obesity and allow them the share their knowledge with family members, friends and others affected by this health issue.

Identified community outcomes:

The community outcomes of the project will consist of the following;

- A healthy local economy

The programme is designed to target the obesity health issue through regular exercise and healthy eating. Through hard work and commitment, all participants will be equipped with the basic knowledge around performing exercises correctly and healthy eating. This will result in less G.P

visits for the family, less funds spent on medical expenses by the family and the more critical patients can be seen quicker by the doctor.

This programme will bring together people of diverse backgrounds and encourage each other to branch out and meet new people. Expanding their network base and form friendly relationships where they can continue their fitness journey outside of the programme.

- Spaces and places that people use and enjoy.

Introducing the participants to the community parks, reserves, local beach, local swimming pool facilities and the Vector Wero aquatic park. These water based facilities will make them more aware of the importance of survival skills around and in water. There is a need for a water safety and swimming lessons for our local people and to introduce a basic programme to get them in the water is a start.

The project includes working with young people who are deemed obese. Through teaching and coaching them the correct technique and form on exercises and the basics around nutrition, not only will they become healthier individuals, but they can teach others about their health journey. Through living a healthier lifestyle would mean fewer visits to the local doctors saving money on medical expenses, resulting in lower costs to the local public health system. This will also allow for the more critical patients to be seen quicker by doctors.

Wheel Blacks will be in a much better position to gain a placing being on their home turf with local community and family support. Not having to travel to another country eliminates travel fatigue and emotional stress from being away from familiar environment and support people.

Identified need:

In the last 12 Months, we have helped over 300 new clients (dads have come to us for help). On average clients will visit 5 times for support and we will make at least one offsite meeting in support. By providing support to dads and organisations that want safer children in safer communities and less domestic violence there needs to be a shift in the amount of support given to parents in particular fathers. When parents, adults stop being violent to one another. When fathers see themselves as equals with equal responsibilities. When shared care or co-parenting is the normal expectation.

Identified community outcomes:

Social services are created as a response to the social need. Our communities need for Great fathers as much as they need great mums. Children are our future and we need to nurture that future by supporting those who care for them, educating those who need knowledge and creating an environment that celebrates and supports all parents/caregivers.

Father and Child is a very small organisation with a big challenge and that challenge is to enable a community to respond to the needs of its fathers in ways that create enduring outcomes for their families and community.

New Zealand deserves to have first world health care, first world education and first world parenting. High domestic violence rates, teenage pregnancy, teen suicide, dad less children and male suicide could all be reduced with initiatives that provide more support. Many of our clients have come from dysfunctional families.

One in three children lives in a single parent family where one parent is disengaged and not involved. 15% of those parents are dads. There are over 15,000 solo dads receiving the Work and

Traditionally many professionals have not recommended shared care arrangements overlooking the true benefits children receive if both the parents are truly focused on their welfare and are equally supported.
