With a growing local Chinese population in Remuera and the Orakei Ward, celebrating Chinese traditions is a good way to encourage their participation in the local community. Aphasia is more common than Parkinson's disease affecting one in three people who have a stroke. In Auckland 2 or 3 people acquire aphasia every day just from stroke. We do not know the true extent of aphasia because statistics for head injury and brain tumour acquired aphasia are not collated. Evidence-based analysis estimates at least 10,000 Aucklanders currently live with aphasia.

Aphasia can affect anyone of any age. While aphasia often affects older people, there has been a marked increase in younger people with stroke and aphasia.

It is widely acknowledged that bird and invertebrate populations significantly increase with the reduction of predators. In the last 12 months a total of 671 mammal pests have been trapped by volunteer trapping programmes in Churchill Park, Kepa Bush, Madills Farm Reserve, Selwyn Bush, St Johns Bush, Tahuna Torea Nature Reserve and Wai-O-Taiki Nature Reserve (data from CatchIt). Many local residents trap predators, however, experience elsewhere suggest that trapping is

required at every 4 properties to reduce the pest population to negligible levels and protect against re-invasion. This is evident from staff meeting discussions, the increase in usage figures and the stretched resources. as well as this, the success of new initiatives simply requires more input from leadership and more co-ordination and or enforcing as to the way facilities are used and how the turnover between events works. The Centre is open longer hours with not enough attention to the way it is used after hours and on weekends. There is not enough resources of time and staff skills to do the job and we are providing services the need of which is in more demand.

A better co-ordinated St Heliers Centre and also including some aspects of the Glendowie Centre programmes. more attention can be given to connecting people to what is available and when one user comes to a programmes they become aware of what else is available and also their experience is simpler, more enjoyable and comprehensive. We attract quite a few people from the city especially migrants who look for other ages to communicate with and who are looking for friends tie down age and opportunities to improve their English and connectedness. Our evening programmes encourage social english and connection.. The programmes we offer, support families and migrants to participate in our community and society

HELP has been providing this service for over 30 years.

- In 2016 there were 730 requested callouts to police and forensic medical examinations, and our counsellors answered 12,179 calls to the crisis line. 493 of these call outs were to Auckland police stations.
- The demand for our service is increasing, with requests from both police and medical staff increasing substantially. Widespread media coverage means that more and more survivors are coming forward for help when it's most needed – but our funding hasn't kept up with the pace. Currently we can only attend 43% of emergency call-outs, which is why we need the support of our community to continue to serve Auckland's most vulnerable.

Identified community outcomes:

The impacts of sexual assault/abuse are far reaching for victims, their families & our communities. Sexual violence disrupts normal attachment and security needs & may cause difficulty in trusting others & in expression of aggressiveness, shame, anxiety & inappropriate sexual behaviour. Research suggests that what happens after a disclosure of sexual abuse can have a significant impact on the long-term health and wellbeing of the victim. A person's sense of being acknowledged, valued and supported is key to recovery and reducing traumatisation. Recovery is much more likely with access to support and healing services, and information about what the

immediate impacts are likely to be. Our Crisis Service acts as an early touch-point to help survivors find further support. Consequently, we also offer crisis support sessions to bridge the gap into therapeutic services. People who are sexually assaulted come from all walks of life. The work that HELP does assists mothers, fathers, aunties, grandmothers, brothers and sisters to fully engage in their family, work and community life. Communities are supported, strengthened, less isolated, less vulnerable with greater wellbeing and inclusiveness.

Identified need:

We carry out annual surveys of members and record the amount of loans requested per city. Last year's library user survey showed that although the service is the most highly rated of all Blind Foundation services, a wider and more current range of titles is needed.

Identified community outcomes:

Local public libraries cannot cater to the low or no vision public and the different formats that are required so the Blind Foundation library plays a critical role in education and supporting development in literacy, reading and learning. People who lose their sight also lose options when it comes to participating in former recreation, work and socialisation activities so are prone to experiencing feelings of disempowerment and isolation. Consequently with much more free time and less to fill it, talking books fill a large gap and many library users are voracious "readers". The Library service is the most highly rated service by members, with a rapidly growing wishlist.
