About half the young people live in the Papakura area and the remainder live in the surrounding area, Manurewa, Manukau and Franklin.</p> <p>The young people will begin the fortnight with a director and a script. During the following days they will work on scene blocking, line learning, costumes, lighting, sound, and props so that at the end of the fortnight there is a fully fledged drama production ready for presentation, worthy of showing to an audience. The play will be presented three times at Off Broadway Theatre in the heart of Papakura.</p>

We have established through observation that many people struggle with self-confidence and their ability to communicate clearly. This problem is especially prevalent among teenagers. Our experience with drama in the past has shown us that particularly working with this educational drama consultant, the young people have gained self-confidence and the ability to speak articulately. For many young people drama can be the first opportunity that they have to perform in public. They gain confidence in their ability to communicate and present themselves in front of others. This is good preparation for future adult responsibilities. This production will be building on a foundation that has been established through past performances and workshops.

Last year was the first time in a full theatre so a step up technically and with a new theme. For this group, 2018 will be the fourth time to work with this educational drama consultant. For all involved, young people, families and drama consultant, this experience is a personal highlight of the year. In 2018 Southside Drama aims to hold the intensive experience over two weeks instead of one week to enable some more complex drama with deeper human themes and sophisticated character development. Theatre lighting and sound will be used giving an further opportunity for individual development.

Community benefits**Identified need:**

The content of the book will fill a gap in the existing historiography/scholarship of the First World War. It will also be a valuable addition to our local history. The Costar family members have had discussions with Professor Glyn Harper of Massey University who has suggested the material should be put into a book format because of the historical value of the documents that have never been seen before.

Identified community outcomes:

The end result will be a history book that will convey the story of two local boys through their letters, postcards, factual documents and photographs and put it firmly in the context of WWI. The wider community will be able to learn about the First World War and how it related to a local family. It will be educational and historical.

While not specifically natural or built heritage, the documentation that exists in the family collection needs to be preserved and protected. We print up to 500 pages per term per school which incurs a big stationery cost over the year. Besides the cost the time preparing each folder by our coordinator can be minimised and better used by spending it in the classroom supporting our Kiwi Can Leaders who deliver the lessons and the students. Community benefits

Identified need:

Prior to the implementation of the Paper4trees programme, schools and preschools were sending paper and cardboard to landfill because they didn't have the infrastructure required to recycle in the classroom. Waste audits in schools have shown that approx. 70% of a schools waste is paper and cardboard, which is a lot of resource to be sending to landfill. The Paper4trees programme was developed to provide that infrastructure, and also provide an incentive to report in how much paper and cardboard they are recycling and therefore diverting from landfill.

Identified community outcomes:

- Students and staff take home the recycling message and set up similar systems within their own homes.
- Some schools donate their plants to local community restoration projects for the whole community to enjoy and benefit from.
- Local businesses, nurseries, transfer stations and recycling contractors also benefit as they are receiving business.
- More native trees are being planted throughout local communities, which attract birds and beautify spaces etc.
- Recycling preserves local landfill space and reduces carbon dioxide in landfill. Recycling is also turned into valuable resource, which prevents natural resources from being depleted.

Identified community outcomes:

Local public libraries cannot cater to the low or no vision public and the different formats that are required so the Blind Foundation library plays a critical role in education and supporting development in literacy, reading and learning.
