Attitude teaches young people how to solve problems, cultivate healthy self-esteem and good mental health, recover from setbacks and understand/improve relationships. With good emotional and resilience skills, teenagers are far less likely to fall into substance abuse, self-harm and dangerous relationships. Families and communities benefit as young people are given tools to become mature, responsible and contributing individuals.
