### **Project: Mentoring support for boys or boys and their Dad's.**

<b>Location:</b>	4A Court Crescent, and in the Panmure, Pt. England and Glen Innes Suburbs.		
<b>Summary:</b>	Many of the families in our community are without a father, or have fathers who are either in transition, in prison, absent, or lack good parenting skills. Young boys growing up in our community are often angry, lack guidance, and been exposed to domestic violence - resulting either in these boys being suicidal or with the Justice system or both. By having a mentor who is a constant in their lives, we believe, will help to alleviate many of the issues our youth face. Fathers will also be provided with good guidance and counsel rather than making mistakes that may be hard to reverse, when raising their children. They can make positive changes now while their children are still impressionable.

### **Community benefits**

#### **Identified need:**

Referrals from schools on boys acting out in class, mothers (a lot of them solo) are struggling to cope with raising their young sons and desperately need help.

#### **Identified community outcomes:**

Please refer to the following case study - the results of which will impact the community over time. A is 9 year old boy whose whanau have history with his school's SENCO's as well as MSD (CYF - Oranga Tamariki). One of his older brothers had been suicidal and involved with Youth Justice. Previous to our involvement A had missed 80-90% of the school year as a truant, his mother unable to control him. A was seen "hustling" for money in Glen Innes, bunking school at either the library or internet cafe and was seen wandering the streets as late as 10pm at night.

Types of support given:

- Mentoring
- Out of school and Weekend pro-social activities
- Weekly visits to both home and school
- Support with medication (ADHD)
- Counselling
- Support with emotional regulation

Results:

- The school's biggest concern for A was his truancy, as well as aggressive and disruptive behaviour during the days he did attend school. Since our involvement and up until the time of writing this report, A has only missed two days of term 2 (these absences were due to illness). A is also taking his medication regularly; the difference in him has been noted by his teacher as "remarkable".

By building up boys and their dads to be strong, confident boys and men. When individuals are healthy mentally, physically and emotionally they have a higher chance of a brighter future by way of being motivated to succeed. This success filters down to their own children and those around them such as family and friends which is possibly able to have a ripple effect on other boys and men in similar situations in the community.

The majority of our clients are Maori and by working with them our aim is to provide Whanau Ora and to uplift their well-being. This mentoring work is targeted at boys and their Dads - out of the 20 boys that were on the mentor's case for the year ended 30/6/17 - 32% were Maori. A large portion of other boys are also part Maori but in some cases we used their other ethnicity for fairness i.e. if 4 children are Maori/ Tongan, we would count 2 as Maori and 2 as Tongan. However, a large number of the boys usually are one part Maori and another ethnicity - there are also a number of boys who identify only as Maori.

#### Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - Our referrals are primarily through the child, but our conditions are that in working with the child we work with the whole family i.e. especially with the Family Work. However, if there is a disabled person in the family and there are issues that we can help with we will.

If required i.e. if the father or young person is a smoker we will definitely address this, respectfully telling them how they can quit smoking

<b>Summary:</b>	KidsCan programmes give very practical support to disadvantaged children. We provide food (Kaweka hot meals, baked beans, scroggin, peaches and more), clothing (raincoats, socks and shoes), and health items (head lice treatment, hand sanitiser, plasters, sanitary pads and more). A Massey University study undertaken in 2010 demonstrated the following outcomes for children taking part in our programmes: reduced anger reduced theft and fighting in the playground, improved attention in class, increased participation, increased attendance and self-worth. The findings from this study have been confirmed time and time again through feedback we get from our schools.

NZ has one of the highest prevalence rates of asthma in the world and one of the most common chronic diseases in children. 1 in 6 Kiwis; that is 700,000 people are affected by Respiratory Disease in New Zealand costing \$6 billion per annum and 3rd leading cause of death. In 9 adults and 1 in 7 children affected by asthma in NZ. 63 die from asthma each year. That is 1 person a week. 15% of Kiwis over 45 have COPD & that is 200,000 people. Several additional hundreds of people in the community likely to have COPD and don't even know it. REDUCING RISK FACTORS for COPD is a priority, and smoking is the most important of these.

#### **Identified community outcomes:**

COPD Awareness & Education in the community is an ideal opportunity for people with COPD and their families to discuss ways of making people more aware of COPD and how to cope with this debilitating disease. Giving up smoking can be difficult, but it is one of the most important things that they can do to improve their asthma and COPD.

Through a recent fitness inquiry we discovered that a huge number of our students are unable to ride a bike. This was a revelation to us. We wanted to do something to encourage bike riding for fitness and as part of our commitment to being a Travel wise school. We need more children and families walking and biking to school to help alleviate our traffic woes.

The bike track will therefore provide a range of services to our school and community.

#### **Identified community outcomes:**

The outcomes for our community are many fold. We know that we will have students who will want to take up bike riding beyond school and this will be good for health and wellbeing but also play a role in reducing our traffic woes. We are currently a 'chaos at the gate' school. We also know that children will boost their confidence through being able to ride and discover their ability to take on and overcome a new challenge. Families at our school will enjoy coming to school and sharing in the riding track. It is staggering to see how many of our students have never ridden a bike. We also want to use the track to teach safety. The few students that do ride bikes tend to have a cavalier attitude to safety.

Finally, we will use the bike track to teach children the technical aspects of bike maintenance and upkeep. These are skills they will have for the rest of their lives. According to the 2013 census carried out showing the ethnic diversity in the Maungakiekie local board area, there are just over 16,000 Asian, African and Middle Eastern residents in the local community. We believe this number would have only continued to increase over the last 4 years with Auckland becoming increasingly culturally diverse. From our 22 years of experience in the Family Violence sector, we have seen the barriers to accessing support that ethnic migrant and refugee women face, including language, isolation and social stigma/family shame. Through this project we want to break down the barriers to access and positive participation in the wider community.

Another benefit would be the reduction of domestic violence and family violence within ethnic communities in the Maungakiekie local board area. ## Community benefits

### Identified need:

Through referrals and people approaching us for help. A big issue are the strained and sometimes violent relationships within marriages or partnerships where the greatest casualties are usually the children. We also are beginning to get referrals from the Kari Centre for support for children and their families.

A few years ago a Niuean woman approached our counsellor for help. She had been ill-treated by her husband and had found herself in a desperate situation where she had begun suffering from depression. Our counsellor worked with her, bringing her to a place of stability.

Last weekend, on 8/10/17, at the age of 53 and properly divorced, she was married again to a man who cares for her.

### Identified community outcomes:

Our counsellors use their professional skills and their faith to bring peace, healing and healthy relationships to couples and families. Change does not come overnight, but as our workers journey and walk beside these individuals and families, being available at any time of the day, night and weekends - stability is brought about and the families and individuals are able to reach a place of wholeness, find gainful employment and become contributing members of society.

We help families with housing (among other things) advocating for them at places like HNZ where, if going on their own, they can sometimes be bullied and intimidated. Our family worker engaged with the client in late September/Early October and found that one of her immediate needs was a warmer house, the family had only one heater which rendered her whole family (parents and

children) continuously sick. The family worker was able to contact HNZ on the 5th of October and HNZ has already arranged for an insulation company to go to the home of the 25th of October. The family worker continues to work with this family, providing food and intervention. Our aim is that families are well care for and are healthy physically and emotionally.

Te Oro and Ruapotaka Marae are predominantly targeting youth in the existing programmes in Glen Innes and confirm that there is a need. Pilot programmes in Maori cultural-based and contemporary Arts approaches have been explored in other suburbs and are indicative that positive outcomes can be expected. Through catering for cultural diversity with a Maori and Pasifika focus, and also offering multi-arts

opportunities which include: tactile and digital arts media, exposure to a range of accessible musical instruments, opportunities to create video presentations and sound recordings, etc. the arts becomes accessible for all to participate and benefit.

**Identified community outcomes:**

People in the Glen Innes community and adjoining suburbs, who are experiencing or recovering from mental health conditions and are isolated, will have the opportunity to become a part of a arts based community project, which will promote social connection, better health and wellbeing and employment skills. Therapeutic benefits of arts-based community projects are well researched and documented as assisting in building cultural identity in areas where cycles of poverty negatively impacts on health and wellbeing. A recent successful South Auckland project was that of the community fence of Rata Vine (Gray, B. p.52-61, ANZJAT 7:1 2012). Liaison has been taking place with Ruapotaka Marae who are focusing on providing programmes for Glen Innes youth and have indicated that this initiative will meet the needs of other adult family members currently not catered for. It is intended that the mural project will focus on a multi-generational response to Te Whare Tapa Wha Maori model of health and will bring focus to the health and wellbeing of the community symbolically.
