Following a workshop discussion (October 26) and a business meeting report (November 16), the Local Board feedback is as follows:

The Puketāpapa Local Board supports option 2: expanded focus, subject to the following comments.

A. General comments

The Board supports full implementation of the Waste Management and Minimisation Plan 2012 and a focus on addressing the three priority commercial waste streams identified in the Waste Assessment:

- construction and demolition waste
- organic waste
- plastic waste

The Board supports advocating to central government for a higher waste levy and for product stewardship, particularly to achieve major reductions in the use of plastic shopping bags.

The Board supports addressing waste generated from council and council controlled organisation's operational activities, particularly construction and demolition waste.

B. Specific comments

- 1) The Board notes a need for more accessible locations for the disposal of the following items
 - a. Tyres
 - b. e-waste
 - c. batteries
 - d. Mattresses
 - e. Fluorescent lightbulbs

Households need regular reminders of opportunities for recycling. (Along the lines of Watercare's Tapped In newsletter on water use)

- 2) Should a higher waste levy be introduced, the Board recommends that Auckland Council identify how a share of this can be used to enhance the education and enforcement needed to meet the target of zero waste by 2040. Particular emphasis should be on education and enforcement in the construction industry.

- 3) The Board requests greater publicity of inorganic collection programmes, including when and where they are available.
- 4) The Board sees a need for significant increase in the availability of public recycling bins alongside landfill ones, similar to those in Whitianga.
- 5) Alternative bins also need to be promoted at privately funded events. (ASB showgrounds is a venue in need of such bins)

Following a workshop update (October 26) and a business meeting report (November 16), the local board feedback is as follows:

The Puketāpapa Local Board supports option 1 of the report: Enhanced status quo, subject to the following comments:

A. General comments

Option 1: enhanced status quo is the preferred option as local boards may not have the resources (time and expertise) to deliver option 2. Additionally, option 3 has merit, however revision and refinement is needed before it can be considered a viable option.

Auckland Council needs to advocate to central government for more funding for new migrants. Central Government needs to create a comprehensive strategy to deal with the complexity around this diversity of need.

Deprivation is listed as a basis of the review, language should also be considered as a future measure.

Further consideration should be made to whether an alternative option, with elements of option 1 and 3, could be viable.

B. Specific comments

Option 2: Locally driven

The Local Board does not support this option for the following reasons:

- Local Board members may not have the required capacity (time and expertise)
- Local Boards are transient (3 year term), this option requires stability

Option 3: Regional service provision

The Local Board does not support this option for the following reasons:

- This option requires an independent review. Auckland Council should not lead this, instead it should be peer-reviewed
- The timeframe for deliberation is too short, however this could be considered in the future with careful consideration of the risks involved.
