Project: The purchase and installation of floodlights

Location:	Totara Hospice South Auckland, 140 Charles Prevost Drive, The Gardens, Auckland		
Summary:	In the last six months we have received multiple requests from Totara Hospice staff and visitors for improved lighting outside the building. They have said they feel unsafe walking to and from their vehicles at night in the upper carpark. In addition, there have been two incidents where people have tripped over at night as a result of reduced visibility due to insufficient lighting. Additionally, recently we had Diesel syphoned from the Totara Hospice truck, which was parked in the Totara Hospice carpark overnight. We believe the lack of lighting in this area makes it an appealing target and the installation of floodlighting would act as a deterrent to thieves, whilst improving the overall safety and security at Totara Hospice.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The installation of new floodlighting in the upper carpark, the patient and visitor carpark and the area outside of Totara House will significantly improve the safety and security of Totara Hospice staff, patients and visitors when they are coming and going from the building at night.

The new lighting would reduce the risk of people tripping due to reduced visibility.

The improved lighting would act as a deterrent to thieves, minimising and potentially preventing incidents of theft or damage taking place on Totara Hospice grounds.

Installing new floodlights on the grounds of Totara Hospice South Auckland will make it much safer for staff, patients and visitors, walking to and from their cars at night. It will also reduce incidents from people tripping due to reduced visibility and increased lighting will be a deterrent for thieves. We believe this will improve the overall health, safety and well-being of our staff, patients, families and the local community.

If we could only get partial funding it would be most beneficial to be put towards a salary.
