Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

Our three main aims are to raise awareness of issues facing our oceans, ensure attendees feel genuine concern for their environment and to enable participants to take action. We want to educate Aucklanders about the severity of ocean issues such as marine pollution, water quality and imbalance of ecosystems due to overfishing, by having a variety of interactive stalls from diverse areas with unique fields of knowledge. By allowing Aucklanders to understand the issues we face, we hope to foster environmental empathy which may be reflected in participants future actions. As a result, we hope to motivate Aucklanders to act, especially in the Orakei Community, making a difference and protecting their iconic coastlines and ocean.

We will measure the effect of our outcomes through the number of people reached by our event, as well as the information gained by the people there and the number of signups to environmental organizations. We are creating a short film of the event, so we will easily be able to track not only the participants but the number of views online, enabling us to see the number of individuals more aware about their oceans. Also, using pledges to protect our oceans (shown in the film) and surveys we will be able to see the impact of the event on environmental empathy. Finally, if people take more action there will be an increased signup in environmental organisations.

The consequences of disease prevention cannot be measured but it is effectively one of my goals as many diseases are psychosomatic in nature.

I have a 76-year-old woman participate, she started last year and comes regularly so my classes reach all ages.

In 2017 YODA records show Youthline received over 300,000 requests for support through our helpline and early intervention services, including approx. 5611 requests from the Orakei region.

Youthline's vital early intervention services give young people the opportunity to seek out information, problem solve an issue and to "talk it out". The services are both a preventative intervention for young people who need to talk through stressors and concerns as well as a first point of entry for young people who are experiencing crisis such as self-harming, suicidal thoughts or behaviour, family violence and a range of other difficulties.

This early intervention service is staffed by a large team of approximately 400 helpline volunteer counsellors - supported by our Clinical Triage Team - providing immediate support, development opportunities and referral services.
