Teachers/teacher aides/carers and other professionals will also benefit from our services and be better informed on how to work with a person with autism.</p> <p>The support groups we offer are run from our offices in New North Road. These groups provide an opportunity for those on the spectrum to socialise with each other in a safe, supportive and fun environment. The group members who participate learn basic social skills that individual's on the spectrum struggle with daily. They also become more confident and socially more appropriate in everyday situations.</p> <p>Approximately 450 people benefit from our organisation's activities in the local board area.</p>

Activities or services organisation offers	Our vision is to promote the best possible health and quality of life for those with asthma and other respiratory conditions, through awareness, education and support. Asthma has no cure and those with asthma need long term care. Even when someone with asthma feels well, they still have the disease and it can flare up at any time, therefore it is necessary to have an asthma management plan in place and for strict compliance with medications. Our service delivers free asthma education and support to enable our clients to take active and effective control of their asthma. We do this by building a partnership with patient, doctor and other health professionals and through up to date treatment and guideline based education programmes. We also work to raise public awareness of asthma, its symptoms and subsequent especially in an asthma emergency.
Activities or services benefit the local board	We provide our clients with health education, home assessments, case management, primary care services focused on living with and managing asthma. Our Nurse Educators deliver critically needed help to thousands of families dealing with the everyday challenges of asthma. In partnership with key community organizations, conduct home visits and environmental interventions, and advocates for policy changes to help improve the health quality of life for people with poorly controlled asthma. 1 in 9 adults and 1 in 7 children in NZ has asthma, and we are here for them when they need us most. We raise awareness of patients, health professionals, and the public that asthma is a serious chronic disease and ensures the recognition of the symptoms of asthma by patients, families, and the public. Our educators ensure effective control of asthma by encouraging a partnership among patients, physicians, and other health professionals through modern treatment and education programs.
Organisation aligns with local board grant programme	Improve the health of our community & communities can participate fully in community life. -We are working to help people in our communities bring asthma under control. The first step is raising awareness throughout communities that asthma is a serious, sometimes life-threatening chronic disease that can be controlled. Reducing the public health burden of asthma through improved asthma control is a goal shared by government, local leaders, patients, their families, and other community stakeholders. Despite scientific advances in asthma management, avoidable hospitalizations, disability, and lost productivity due to asthma remain high. We want to make asthma a priority for everyone. With our help all schools and childcare settings should be able to prepare and implement a comprehensive plan to address asthma, including how to prevent and respond to emergencies. Our Breathe easy asthma education project for schools outline specific actions, policies, and procedures consistent with evidence-based asthma guidelines and best practices.
Need for organisation to operate out of premises	Asthma Auckland represents the views and best interests of those affected by asthma in Auckland when it comes to key stakeholders, including the government, industry, healthcare providers, and community agencies. We also facilitate and engage in dialogue and debate on issues that impact people with asthma in the community, including children in lower socioeconomic areas, Pacific Islanders and Maori. These groups are all considered to be hard to reach, and are known to suffer from under recognition of symptoms and disease severity, as well as increased attendance to the

	emergency department. We work with Primary Health and other key organisations to improve asthma awareness, control and self-management in areas of high deprivation. We also ensure asthma is given a higher priority in local plans for commissioning and delivering health services. Beyond that, we raise awareness among health and education professionals and promote best practice to achieve improved health outcomes.
Cheaper locations or shared/collaborative spaces	We have our own Asthma Mobile bus in a specially built garage in the premises. We share the building with Asthma New Zealand staff as well. Every 2 months we have the Breath Easy® 'NEAT' Course (Nurse Education in Asthma Treatment) & Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) courses for nurses, pharmacists, physiotherapists and other qualified health professionals. Once a month we have COPD support group meeting in our premises. Our client's spirometer testing to be done in our clinic and some of our older adults come for education sessions.

Activities or services organisation offers	CVNZ offers volunteers from all sectors of the community a wide variety of opportunities to get involved in their local parks and reserves. Conservation Volunteers' goal is 'To increase resilience through the protection, maintenance and restoration of the environment – landscapes, habitats, species and heritage.' To do this, we run conservation projects that take place in urban, regional and remote locations, with a variety of activities that provide solutions for the many conservation issues affecting our environment. We run up to five volunteer teams in any given week, each team with the capacity of 10 volunteers. Volunteer teams are guided and managed by highly skilled team leaders with qualifications in environmental science, workplace health and safety, first aid and defensive driving.
Activities or services benefit the local board	Volunteer activities contribute to the overall management of parks and reserves in all of these board areas, improving biodiversity outcomes by controlling environmental pest plants and animals, maintaining tracks and trails, and planting native plants. Benefits to volunteers (who live in the local board areas) include physical health, sense of place, stewardship over a particular site, participation in the local community, interaction with different cultures, team work, education, rehabilitation and employment. Annual visitor/user numbers to each of the parks is estimated to be in the thousands - all of these people enjoy direct benefits from the volunteer activities undertaken as the work we do enhances the environment for the benefit of current and future generations.

We have a close relationship with Volunteering Auckland who neighbour us in this building.

It motivates men to change their behaviour and helps them develop the insight and skills they need to maintain respectful, non-violent relationships. Shine's statistics indicate 211 people from within the Albert-Eden local board area have been helped through our crisis advocacy services over the past twelve months.

At Shine we provide advocacy to mainly women victims of domestic violence and children/youth to ensure they feel safe through age appropriate safety planning, and provide a 'safe place' for children and youth to express their thoughts and feelings about domestic violence. Shine also relies on community volunteers to help support our services.

Activities or services organisation offers	Our purpose at Plunket is to support the development of healthy families/whānau by ensuring that all families in New Zealand get the support they need. We believe that by connecting families/whānau to their community, and assisting parents and caregivers through advocacy and professional support, we can achieve our goal of helping give the best start for every child. Our century-long advocacy on behalf of New Zealand's babies and families is at the heart of all that we strive to achieve. Plunket provides a wide range of community services including coffee groups, playgroups, Parent Education Programmes, volunteer home visiting, and First Aid courses. The wider community is also strengthened through the connections made by parents and parents/caregivers feel more secure and supported when they are part of groups such as these.
Activities or services benefit the local board	The Pt Chevalier Plunket Playgroup is a place where families/whanau and caregivers can meet in a safe and non-judgemental environment which allows them to connect and participate in their community. The mums, dads, grandparents and caregivers who attend receive parent to parent support from each other and friendships made can last a lifetime. The playgroup is promoted by the local Plunket nurse and Community Support Coordinator who encourage the family to become part of this community group. The group is run by a paid coordinator but is supported by a small group of volunteers. They help to fundraise to cover additional costs. Each week 34 children and their parent(s) / caregivers attend the playgroup but we estimate that 60 - 70 families a year benefit from this local group.
Organisation aligns with local board grant programme	While playgroups are primarily developed for children, the social benefits extend far beyond the playgroup. Bringing families together lessens the isolation that is so prevalent in communities, particularly for new parents and/or migrants who may have no close family support. Often these families/whanau are particularly vulnerable and the playgroup provides an opportunity to receive parent-to-parent support as well as education and guidance from the group facilitator. Parents are also encouraged to volunteer with aspects of the groups such as leading sessions and leading local fundraising events. This has a two-fold benefits as it provides the parents with a sense of purpose and belonging, and it also benefits the community as a whole as connections and relationships are developed and encouraged.
Need for organisation to operate out of premises	The Scout Hall on Moa Rd has been the home of the Pt Chevalier playgroup for a number of years. It's central location in Pt Chevalier and easy parking for mothers with children is an advantage and they have a large secure outdoor area where it is safe for the children to play. They also make available a secure storage area where the outdoor play equipment, art and craft supplies and other toys are stored. They have kitchen facilities and easy access toileting facilities suitable for large numbers of children and families.
