Community benefits

Identified need:

16,731 Pacific people live in this local board area, which is 25.9% of local board population. Of this 38% are Tongans. 5.2% of Pacific people are 65+. 16% of the organisation registered ADHB (767) patients are 65+. Compared this to 10% Maungakiekie Local Board population for same age band. There's clear indication here that there are lower proportion of Pacific people over 65+ compared to ADHB patients enrolled here at the Tongan Health Society or local board population. Elderly Day Activities will hopefully empower the Pacific communities, especially the Tongan communities and their families to live healthier and longer life.

Identified community outcomes:

The benefits are great, participants can learn about better ways of cooking their favourite food, get them out of the house and be more mobile, the men can have a plot on site to grow their own vegetable garden, women could share their skills in weaving / knitting and much more. Our expert speakers and educators to give them information to increase their awareness and self-management skills.

It's known elderly pacific people don't engage in mainstream community activities. Barriers to participation include issues with transportation, cultural differences, limited communication, literacy, high dependency on family members, social and financial limitations, and difficulties navigating NZ systems e.g. health, education etc. Our Doctors, Nurses and Community and Social workers, counsellors identified that elderly people have limited community engagement, social well-being, isolation while family members are working / training which affects social well-being.

The project will address the gap in pacific elderly day program in the Central Local Board catchment and will provide opportunities for elderly community engagement in a culturally appropriate program.

Our weekly drop in programme at the Centre has identified a high need of providing a platform where the youth and community can showcase and express their talents in all art forms. Somewhere it is local and they engage with each other to create, support and enhance their talents.

Identified community outcomes:

The Onehunga/Oranga community have been for a while gone without in terms of activities which attract, engage and promote participation of young people in the area. Music and Arts in general is an area which most of the young people of the relate well to and are very keen to take part if there were workshops available.

Music Lab offers such avenue for them to participate, be inspired, be creative and be empowered to know they can use what talents they have in Arts to start a career for their futures. Summary:	This project involves Attitude presenters visiting three Maungakiekie-Tamaki high schools as required during 2018 to deliver 17 life skills, mental health and wellbeing presentations to students in the funding region, as well as provide them with Hardwired (addictions) handbooks. The main objectives of the Attitude programme are to encourage mental & emotional resilience and help prevent youth suicide, teen pregnancy, drug & alcohol abuse and low self-esteem - some of the main issues NZ young people are struggling with today. Students are empowered to reach their potential, make good decisions, recognise they have a voice, and contribute towards making their community a safe place.

Community benefits

Identified need:

NZ statistics are alarming and some of the worst in the world when it comes to Youth suicide, teenage pregnancy and STIs. Bullying in schools, criminal assaults by children and teenage binge drinking culture are frequently in the media.

- Student feedback obtained through our third party online evaluation survey gives strong evidence for the need for and success of our programmes.
- We have been delivering presentations in Maungakiekie schools for 18 years and are always invited back. These invitations give a clear indication that schools endorse our programmes and see a need for what we are doing.

Identified community outcomes:

The Attitude programme develops young people by teaching them how to make good decisions and inspiring them to implement these decisions. We help them focus on their strengths; we equip them to engage with and solve problems, cultivate healthy self-esteem and good mental health, recover from setbacks, and understand and improve relationships. With good emotional and resilience skills, teenagers are less likely to fall into substance abuse, self-harm and dangerous relationships. Students are empowered to make informed choices and negotiate their teenage years in a safe and positive way and so become positive contributors to society.

- Through improved decision making our programmes encourage students to positively contribute towards making their community a safe and friendly environment for all, irrespective of age, ethnicity or ability.
- Volunteering is promoted and students are encouraged to become involved in the caring and building of their community and its members.
- Young people are given insights into their own family dynamics and provided keys on how to get on better with their families.

Community benefits

Identified need:

By watching the activity in the kitchen during breakfasts. By speaking with the Breakfast Co-ordinator who requested the steriliser and others who volunteer their time. By understanding the need for greater hygiene practices, greater efficiencies within the kitchen and lower everyday costs to run these breakfasts, so they will be maintained for the new five days a week. Being aware of the environmental concerns around disposal of plastic and other throw away items.

Identified community outcomes:

For five mornings a week a good nutritious breakfast will be available to all our students, which will help enable them to be ready for a day's learning. If a child is hungry it is difficult for them to concentrate and thus to learn. We also have other siblings and some parents who join the breakfasts, as we do not turn people away. For many reasons many of our students arrive at school before 7.30 in the morning, even though school does not start until 8.45am. This has been an ongoing problem, especially on wet days, so having the breakfasts which are available from 7.30am will also help alleviate this concern.

Community benefits

Identified need:

As a destination Catholic school most of our students travel by bus or car and very few have opportunities to learn how to ride a bike or ride regularly. This project will help address the barriers to riding. Our school is used by families, community groups, church groups, after school/holiday programmes. We believe providing a variety of facilities on our grounds is what creates great local communities. Auckland is investing in cycling infrastructure, but we need to teach children how to cycle in order for return on this investment to be maximised. This project will help train all our students on riding confidently and competently so they can use the cycle facilities outside our school grounds.

Identified community outcomes:

Once facilities and equipment are in place and cycle lessons can start, we know that 100% of our students will know how to ride and develop competence and confidence on a bike. More riding will help improve their fitness and health, concentration in the classroom and behaviour management, and build self-esteem and resilience. Our community will have access to somewhere local to ride without having to travel great distances to bike parks across Auckland.

Community benefits

Identified need:

Communicare has been running friendship centres for 59 years with no letup in demand for membership. Only yesterday (Monday 19 March 2018) the NZ Herald had a two-page feature headed "Growing issue of loneliness facing elderly" in which it said one in five older New Zealanders identified as being lonely. While our friendship centres continue to address this issue there remains the need for us to provide a fully supportive administrative network and operate from a central location that best provides this very necessary backing.

Identified community outcomes:

Through our friendship centres Communicare aims to better connect with local communities. By running the centres locally we can maintain that local community focus achieving: 1. the centre is open and accessible to all elderly and disabled in the local community; 2. it is staffed by a local coordinator who is supported by local volunteers sharing a local community network; 3. our members are better supported in their community, are able to stay living locally in their own homes longer, and are far less at risk of social isolation. The health and wellbeing of our members within their local community is paramount. The consistency of our service delivery is the key to our success. It is therefore vital that we have a central space from which to manage this.

Community benefits

Identified need:

In 2016, 59 Kiwis aged 10-19 died by suicide, according to the Coroner's figures. NZ has the highest rate of teen suicide in the developed world. In the last few years our frontline teams have recorded significant increases in the risk they are working with. Since 2014, we are working with six times as many clients in crisis, are making almost three times as many mental health referrals and reporting twice as many incidents related to suicide and care and protection. In the grant period 2016 - 2017 Youthline were contacted by over 930 high risk suicidal clients and Youthline supported 303 crisis interventions working alongside the police, St Johns ambulance and crisis intervention team preventing young people from imminent harm.

Identified community outcomes:

Triage deliver Early Intervention steps on the Helpline, which research indicates helps to reduce the likelihood of issues escalating, making a significant contribution in preventing and reducing suicide amongst young people. Triage staff responds to situations of low to high and imminent risk across all mediums of contact, providing a continuum of support and linking service users with other agencies in their own communities. Utilising and promoting Youthline's strengths-based, wrap round approach, Triage staff are responsible for the quality assessment and management of clients (young people and their families), including those with high and complex needs.

Youthline’s vital early intervention services give young people the opportunity to seek out information, problem solve an issue and to “talk it out”. The services are both a preventative intervention for young people who need to talk through stressors and concerns as well as a first point of entry for young people who are experiencing crisis such as self-harming, suicidal thoughts or behaviour, family violence and a range of other difficulties. This early intervention service is staffed by a large team of approximately 400 helpline volunteer counsellors - supported by our Clinical Triage Team - providing immediate support, development opportunities and referral services.
