Our Sustainability Adviser assesses the buildings looking for efficiency opportunities beyond the immediate changes we make, i.e. heating, ventilation, and appliance efficiency. These ideas are then turned into an Efficiency Action Plan, which sets out a list of specific actions the club could take to further reduce its environmental impact and running costs. We also reach out to club members by installing posters and light switch stickers to inspire members to take the same positive actions at home. We offer support and advice to clubs on an ongoing basis.

Community benefits

Identified need:

The demand for LiteClub is huge: 117 clubs registered and are waiting for our service, including 10 of the 42 nominated clubs in this application. Community sports clubs are facing difficult financial times. Many are experiencing membership decline, decreasing profits from bar facilities, and club operating costs are rising. Leading scientists conclude that we're depleting Earth's resources faster than nature is able to replenish them. LiteClub is measuring genuine impact reductions by reducing electricity consumption and emissions from waste sent to landfills.

Identified community outcomes:

By implementing the 42 community sports clubs across the Pukatapapa, Otara-Papatoetoe, Henderson-Massey, Mangere-Otahuhu, Howick, Hibiscus & Bays, Devonport-Takapuna, Kaipatiki, Waitemata, Albert Eden, Maungakiekie-Tamaki, Orakei, and Franklin Local Board areas approximately 18,000 club officials and club members will be exposed to our messages. We believe these people and their clubs will benefit in terms of: Improved infrastructure for community sport; reduced electricity, water and waste disposal costs for clubs; improved human health and safety; improved aesthetics and functionality; enhanced 'feel good' via Litefoot Ambassadors inspiring change; enhanced cultural awareness of sustainability issues; increased awareness and uptake of electricity, water and waste minimisation practices.

More recently, the programme is evolving through pilot projects, geared towards mobilising the local community to take charge and responsibility of looking after lonely and isolated older people living in their area. Examples include the Community Mobilisation project currently underway, as well as the “adopt a village” project that is bringing school children and vulnerable older people together; both seed projects with potential to empower the local community to care for their local elders.

Community benefits

Identified need:

We are the primary agency that supports older people across Central and West Auckland. Through service delivery in the form of social work, elder abuse and neglect assistance, and our empowering communities and community development programmes, we have established the demand and requirement for there to be an expanded level of preventative programmes and services aimed at assisting those who are at the lower end of the vulnerability scale from slipping further, via a variety of methods, including regular volunteer visitors, facilitating their assimilation into existing activities, clubs and groups, as well as equipping them with new skills and knowledge through our ageing well free workshops. Existing attendance (888 to workshops in FY2017), and continued demand has demonstrated the need.

Identified community outcomes:

- Older people are connected with their community either via one on one visiting, via facilitation to join existing groups or both.
- The broader community is engaging with lonely and isolated older people, and assisting them in a community led manner e.g. Adopt a village, Community mobilisation and similar projects.
- Older people have accessible information on ageing well and ageing in place through workshops

in their local community.

- We capture those who do unfortunately end up needing social work or elder abuse support early in the piece to mitigate the negative effects on their health and well-being.

The project seeks to assist lonely, isolated and potentially vulnerable older adults to fully participate in community life and opportunities through active facilitation. The facilitation is designed to develop community volunteers to ensure that the on-going support for older people is sustainable in the long-term and does not lead to a dependency model (i.e. older people are supported to engage and helped to overcome obstacle and hence not dependent on outside support), The project supports those currently unable to participate or utilise facilities to do-so and hence promotes well-being.

Community benefits

Identified need:

This initiative is designed to provide school-aged children with the opportunity to participate in a revival of a traditional Maori Sport. Until now, traditional Maori games, such as Ki-O-Rahi, have never been as accessible to communities as other sports (Rugby, Netball, and Touch). This programme allows the opportunity to reach more people and increase its exposure and awareness to. Schools are asking for access to a wider variety of in-school sporting options and a recent increased focus on Maori culture and language has seen traditional Maori games frequently requested. With Ki-O-Rahi tournaments on the rise nationally, this programme opens the door to more schools to form teams and participate in traditional Maori sports and games.

Identified community outcomes:

1. To increase physical activity levels within school-aged Aucklanders

Our approach to increasing the participation rate is three fold; a. By providing consistent, expert led delivery ensuring at least 74,000 individual participant engagements, b. By providing the skills and confidence for teachers to continue to led the programme (500 teacher modelling sessions), c. By ensuring each school receives a Kit of required equipment (41 kits to be provided). Each kit will include a logbook for logging utilisation hours. The log book, along with participant surveying will provide the key measures for the initiative.

2. Improved cultural awareness

Our second outcome is for our targeted children to experience the physical, emotional and spiritual (Hauora) aspects of the Maori culture while learning this game. An example of this is via Ki-O-Rahi. For this traditional Maori sport, the sessions will include more than just playing the game. It is important for participants to be aware of the history, legend and tikanga (values) of the game. Each session will include an introduction, previous session recap, Te Reo learnings, progressive skill coaching and practical game experience, all within a fun, safe environment.

Summary:	Encourage public place re-cycling by trialling the use of a Reverse Vending Machine (RVM) in Waiheke to collect beverage containers for recycling. Unlike a traditional vending machine, where customers insert payment for items that are then dispensed, the RVMs allow users to insert their empty aluminium cans and PET plastic bottles for recycling in return for rewards. The aim of the trial is to see if RVMs would be a viable option to help reduce litter in hotspot areas and to provide better recycling options for members of the public while out and about.		
Focus specific:	Environmental benefits: Plastic never goes away and it's increasingly finding its way into our oceans and onto our beaches. If we can increase the amount we recycle in NZ we can reduce what ends up in land fill and in our waterways and oceans. Our current methods of recycling only work so far therefore we need to come up with new and better ways of getting people to recycle especially when they are on the go. A RVM trial is a great way to reduce waste during the project but also will give us an opportunity to test and investigate alternative solutions.

Community benefits

Identified need:

New Zealander's use around 2 billion glass and plastic bottles per year with approximately only 35-40% of those being recycled. The report, "The InCentive to Recycle", states the equivalent of 700 jumbo jets full of beverage containers are thrown into the environment or landfills each year, costing New Zealand millions of dollars in clean-up costs and loss of valuable resources. By trialling a RVM in Waiheke we can help reduce waste. Waiheke's population doubles over summer with many tourists who don't know how or where to recycle we want to make it as easy as possible for this group to re-cycle by incentivising them to do so.

Identified community outcomes:

1) Increased re-cycling in public places in particular areas that have high visitors rates who are known to be less inclined to recycle. As Waiheke has a high rate of visitors it is important to offer visitors the opportunity to recycle. We would like to see fewer PET plastic bottles and aluminium cans discarded in public place bins as well as less litter dropped on our beaches and public places.

2) Increased awareness and public support for re-cycling especially among tourists. If we can incentivise re-cycling we can encourage people to make recycling a habit when they are away from home.

3) Determine whether RVMs are an effective way to encourage public place recycling .Greater understanding of public acceptance and appetite for a bottle deposit scheme. We believe that bottle deposit schemes are a great in option in New Zealand to help increase our rate of recycling especially outside of the home. Running a trial project will provide information, data and key learning to help support the case for a Bottle deposit scheme across all of NZ.

Reverse vending machines are a fun and interactive way for communities to get involved with recycling.
