Papakura City BMX Club searched for years to find a new site and is excited to now be at Colin Dale Park, Wiri.

The club chose to relocate because:

- The current site has insufficient space to enhance our track and surrounds to current national and international standards; and
- Our start ramp needs replacing at an estimated \$60,000, as we and the council consider the current ramp is unsafe and will become increasingly dangerous as the metal shipping containers it is built upon deteriorate; and
- Continual break-ins, burglaries and vandalism of club facilities are a drain on the club's resources; and
- Harassment and intimidating behaviour, including physical assaults and verbal abuse, directed towards our young riders and adults, from some locals.

Identified community outcomes:

The club is able to provide a safe, supervised environment that not only assists children and adults in learning to ride it encourages them to extend their skill capabilities. Riders find navigating hazards, jumps, and corners improves their balance, their ability to anticipate what is happening on

the track, and the evasive options available to them if another rider changes their racing line, falls off or physically leans on them. A natural extension of these skills is evident in their awareness of their surroundings so are better equipped to undertake safe manoeuvres when riding unsupervised on the road.

By providing a challenging physically demanding course it naturally appeals to the 9 –12 age group who are likely to indulge in high risk behaviour and provides a natural safe outlet for their risk taking behaviour.

Skill levels of riders continue to increase, and the extreme nature of the sport, combined with the camaraderie, continues to keep youth and adults alike engaged and enthralled.

The Attitude programme develops young people by teaching them how to make good decisions and inspiring them to implement these decisions. Community benefits

Identified need:

Family violence has inter-generational effects and the contexts for migrant and refugee children and young people are different to the older generations. Asian, Middle Eastern children and youth face more barriers to seeking help for family violence and tend to have low reporting rates. In the workshops conducted as part of the Find Your Voice project, we found in one workshop that 2 out of 8 South Asian girls who were experiencing violence at home sought help from school counsellors about it.

Because of our youth engagement efforts, several young people have accessed Shakti's services. Several young people who are involved in Shakti groups in their schools have disclosed histories of witnessing or experiencing violence themselves.

They also network and foster relationships with people in Ōtara-Papatoetoe to spread the word about Toolbox.		

Community benefits

Identified need:

Studies show raising the confidence and competence of parents through parenting programmes has positive effects in reducing negative outcomes like child abuse, teenage pregnancy, and youth suicide in our young people. Sustained increase in demand by participants, as well as the continued enthusiasm and support for our programmes by our community partners, is evidence Toolbox parenting courses are meeting an important need. Each year more community groups request we train their people as Toolbox facilitators, or run Toolbox courses on their behalf. Last year 75% of courses were run through community and social service organisations.

Identified community outcomes:

The community outcomes Toolbox courses in Ōtara-Papatoetoe will provide are:

1. A foundation for long-term systematic social change through its impact upon families involved. For an alarmingly large number of attendees, the material is completely new. They may be several generations removed from functional family life and for them, the knowledge presented is revolutionary. As individual lives are transformed through parenting education, the community is transformed.
2. Ensuring that every person who wants to improve their wellbeing through parenting by attending a Toolbox course is able to.
3. Ensuring the courses are engaging, relevant, up-to-date, applicable to life and enjoyable so that

most participants attend at least 5 out of the 6 sessions.

As young peoples' lives are transformed through receiving parenting education, neighbourhoods will also be transformed.

The Building Awesome Whānau Toolbox course is designed specifically for Māori families. It was developed in collaboration with Māori staff, Toolbox facilitators, educators, kaumātua, social service agencies and Māori families. This Toolbox considers needs, strengths, and socio-economic nature of Māori. The best evidence-informed parenting techniques and insights are presented in a way that is understandable, relevant and culturally appropriate. Particular attention is paid to using appropriate and understandable language in all material. Although designed for Māori it has proven to have appeal and efficacy with a wide range of vulnerable families. Our ultimate aim is that it will increase the number of at-risk families completing a parenting programme and reduce disparities in health and social outcomes within this sector.

Promoting SmokeFree:

Toolbox courses aim to improve the wellbeing of Ōtara-Papatoetoe families and young people. Toolbox participants receive messages about the importance of creating family values and living by them. Through this process, parents are encouraged to examine their beliefs, habits, routines and home life and this often leads to a reduction in negative habits such as smoking and drinking happening in the home.

Project: 3 HOPE (Healthy Options = Positive Eating) Courses

Summary:	HOPE is run over four sessions by previous participants who have been empowered to deliver the programme. Participants of all ages learn about healthy food choices and physical activities that families can enjoy together. A three month follow up programme measures adherence to the family action plan. Located in community settings so that cost and accessibility issues do not prevent people from learning about diabetes, HOPE respects participants' cultures. By including the elders, HOPE reduces the social isolation that can be experienced by this age group. Community benefits

Identified need:

It is estimated that one in four Aucklanders have diabetes or pre-diabetes. The populations with a high risk of being diagnosed with diabetes include South Asians, Pacific people and Maori. Research shows a strong causal link between poverty, obesity and type 2 diabetes and that 15% of people living in the Manukau East General Electorate District (GED) and 13.4% of those living in the Manurewa GED have diabetes. The Ministry of Health (MOH) recognises the vital role that community organisations plays in meeting the serious health challenges presented by diabetes. HOPE addresses four of the MOH's six priority action areas: increasing knowledge and raising awareness, supporting healthy lifestyle choices, enabling effective self-management, and detecting diabetes early.

Identified community outcomes:

- An increase in the number families from populations with a high risk of being diagnosed with diabetes incorporating healthy eating guidelines into their diets.

- An increase in physical activity among people with a high risk of being diagnosed with diabetes.
- An increase in the number of volunteer HOPE champions delivering the HOPE programme in their communities.
- Strong cohesive communities where people feel encouraged and engaged to fully participate.
- Strengthened family wellbeing.

The key tenets of the HOPE programme are to empower people to live healthily while still enjoying their cultural foods and participating fully in their community. The programme relies on community groups and community leaders to arrange suitable times and venues and to recruit participants. In many cases these community organisations request the courses to be run among their people. As HOPE Champions are empowered to lead the programme not only is HOPE's reach expanded but the model is continually refined to reflect the needs and priorities of the local community.

The cross-generational, family, fun and community focuses of the programme will also improve their social and cultural and wellbeing by bringing people of all ages together.
