Community benefits

Identified need:

TAPAC is in constant contact and communication with the community and our programmes are created according to community need.

Feedback suggests that there is a real appetite from students and teachers from low-decile schools to be able to attend high-quality theatre productions.

TAPAC's 2017 children's production 'Tom's Marvellous Imagination' attracted and delighted hundreds of children from all over Auckland, including those from several low-decile schools that were offered free bus and theatre tickets thanks to funding from the Lottery Grants Board. Feedback from students and teachers was overwhelmingly positive.

Identified community outcomes:

Being able to offer children from four Whau schools free tickets to Beauty and the Beast, transportation, and access to a pre-show theatre workshop would provide them with a unique, immersive theatrical experience that will give them a deeper understanding of theatre and could potentially spark a lifelong appreciation for the arts.

Giving children the opportunity to attend high-quality theatre is essential in inspiring creativity in our younger generations. Amongst our 5 -12 year olds is the next Jennifer Ward-Lealand, or Taika Waititi, or Jane Campion and sparking an interest is the first step to achieving those dreams.

The benefits to children of attending live theatre are well-documented with numerous scientific studies revealing that trips to the theatre boost literacy and vocabulary, encourage communication and imagination, lengthen attention span and enhance tolerance and empathy.

We know from experience that participation in the performing arts helps to enhance and improve the quality of lives for people in our community. We believe that it is vital that students and teachers from low-decile schools are also given the opportunity to engage with high-quality performing arts programmes and events.

In 2016, 59 Kiwis aged 10-19 died by suicide, according to the Coroner's figures. NZ has the highest rate of teen suicide in the developed world. In the last few years our frontline teams have recorded significant increases in the risk they are working with. Since 2014, we are working with six times as many clients in crisis, are making almost three times as many mental health referrals, and reporting twice as many incidents related to suicide and care and protection. In the grant period 2016 - 2017 Youthline were contacted by over 930 high risk suicidal clients and Youthline supported 303 crisis interventions working alongside the police, St Johns ambulance and crisis intervention team preventing young people from imminent harm

Identified community outcomes:

Triage deliver Early Intervention steps on the Helpline, which research indicates helps to reduce the likelihood of issues escalating, making a significant contribution in preventing and reducing suicide amongst young people. Triage staff responds to situations of low to high and imminent risk across all mediums of contact, providing a continuum of support and linking service users with other agencies in their own communities. Utilising and promoting Youthline's strengths-based, wrap around approach, Triage staff are responsible for the quality assessment and management of clients (young people and their families), including those with high and complex needs.

Community benefits

Identified need:

A topic currently in the media daily, depression is an epidemic in New Zealand, particularly for Māori males. "Black Dog" was the name Winston Churchill gave to "the prolonged fits of depression from which he suffered" in a diary entry in 1944. This analogy has since been used around the world in many different ways to shed some light on this crippling mental health issue. LBB will not necessarily find a solution to this problem. It will, however, provide a valuable platform to facilitate open kōrero and inspire healing around depression. We may never rid ourselves of our 'little black bitch' - she is deeply rooted in our own tōtō. But we can take her for a walk now and then.

Identified community outcomes:

The target audience is our rangatahi, our young people. But it is also for the wider whanau and communities who surround our rangatahi. By putting our entire whānau in the same room to experience the same story at the same time is the essence of manaakitanga. For audiences to watch, feel, hear and identify with characters who inherently mirror themselves is incomparable therapy. When audiences feel empowered to challenge their own thoughts and opinions around depression, it is incomparable therapy. By providing a platform in that room to have an open kōrero, a space to sit and listen to others talking about their experiences with depression, audiences are allowed to feel, to stand up, and to speak out without judgement, it is incomparable therapy. LBB is also an incredibly entertaining piece of theatre, showcasing the skills of 5 actors (including song and movement) sharing the most ataahua Māori tikanga (ideals and practices), whanaungatanga and manaakitanga - a hearty story with no reference whatsoever to drugs, gangs or other cliché conflicts of colonialism.
