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Harbourview - Orangihina	Te Atatu Road	Te Atatu Peninsula	1	Orangihina - named after O Rangihina, a papakainga (village) north of the park which carried the name of Rangihina an ancestress of the Kawerau a Maki and Ngāti Whātua people. This reserve has spectacular views across the Waitemata Harbour.	The area between Spinnaker Strand and Harbour View Reserve was traditionally known as O Rangihina, which was a large kainga (village) located on the Orangihina Reserve. this area is of special significance to Te Kawerau A Maki as it was occupied for many generations, and as it carries the name of the ancestress Rangihina. This woman was a leader of Ngati Poataniwha and was the wife of the renowned Te Kawarau a Maki rangatira, Te Au o Te Whenua who controlled all of what is now Waitakere city in his day. In 1996, Waitakere City Council decided to set aside the northern part of the lower terrace and escarpment of Harbourview as "Lowland Reserve". In 1997, a further piece of land was set aside as "South Harbour Reserve", this being the remainder of the foreshore, lower terrace and escarpment, and the central part of the upper terrace. After survey of public opinion in 2000, revealed that the majority of respondents wanted the rest of the land set aside as a People's Park' with no commercial development rather than a 'museum of gardens' with commercial development or a combined park and commercial development, the Council resolved that all of the remaining undeveloped land at Harbourview South should be gazetted as Open Space reserve and that the land known as Stage 2A should be returned to Council ownership for retention as parkland. At the Council's invitation, the Te Atatu Residents' and Ratepayers' Association (TARRA) presented a proposal for the Harbour View People's Park in May 2001. Sources: Waitakere City Council. There have been many stories and much speculation about Henry Swan. He has been immortalised in Maurice Shadbolt's book "Dove on the Waters". He has been portrayed as an eccentric old man with an air of mystery about him, a recluse who lived on board his yacht. Much of the information is conflicting. Today, Swan is remembered for the charming brick arch he built over the Creek between 1901 and 1930. The arch sat at the head of a swimming pool and, according to Mrs Cooper of Whangaparoa, who swam in it as a child, this had a natural sandstone bottom that Swan scrubbed clean at low tide. The arch spanned a tributary, which now flows through a concrete pipe from under Edmonton Road, under the arch and under Central Park Drive into the Creek. The arch is made of bricks and mortar and finely built. It has been restored and, along with the remains of the underground cellar, is the central feature of the Swan Reserve today. The cellar is most likely the structure described in one of his obituaries as a fireproof cave in which he stored his literature, reference books and an encyclopaedia. After some heated debate over the issue, Council researched the exact boundaries of the original winery and came up with 4 options for naming the park, which then went back for a further round of submissions. Finally, in 1997, after extensive public consultation, the original 12 ha of the winery, (20% of the park), minus the Depot, was renamed Birdwood Winery Estate in recognition of the Croatian history. The rest of the park, 80 % of the total 60 ha area, which had not been part of the winery, remained as Te Rangi Hiroa Reserve. Birdwood Winery Estate was the home of Simun Ujdur, it's founder. He made a significant contribution to the development of the New Zealand wine industry, to the Dalmatian community in New Zealand and the development of West Auckland as a whole. Birdwood was the name of the hills or area and was named after "General William Birdwood, an Imperial Indian Army officer who planned the ANZAC landings at Gallipoli and subsequently commanded New Zealand and Australian troops in bloodbaths at the Somme and Ypres in World War 1. Of the six sites which were relocated during development, only a portion of two remain at the western end. The only site which was not relocated appears to have been destroyed during modification of the area. A further midden exists at the eastern end by Luckens Point.
