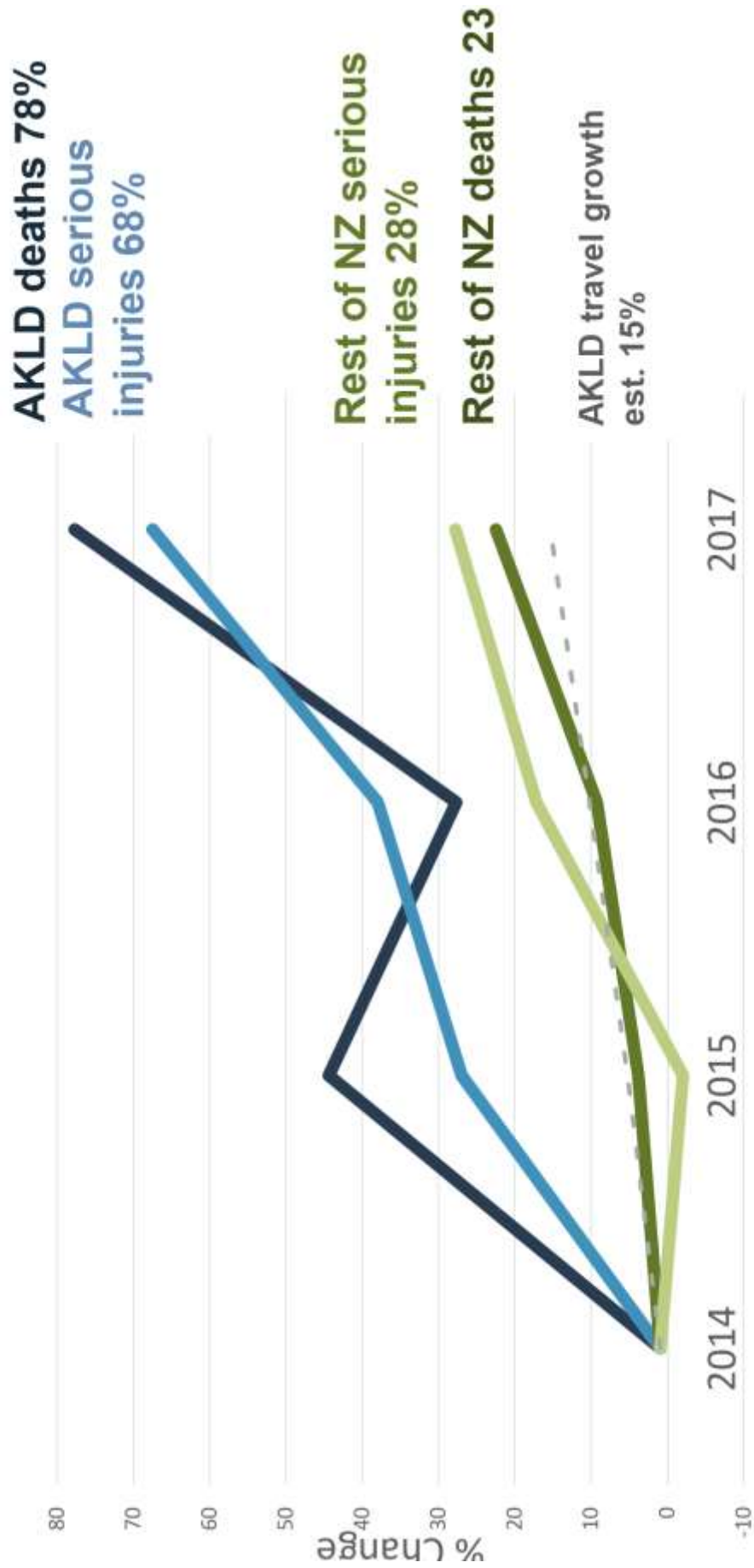

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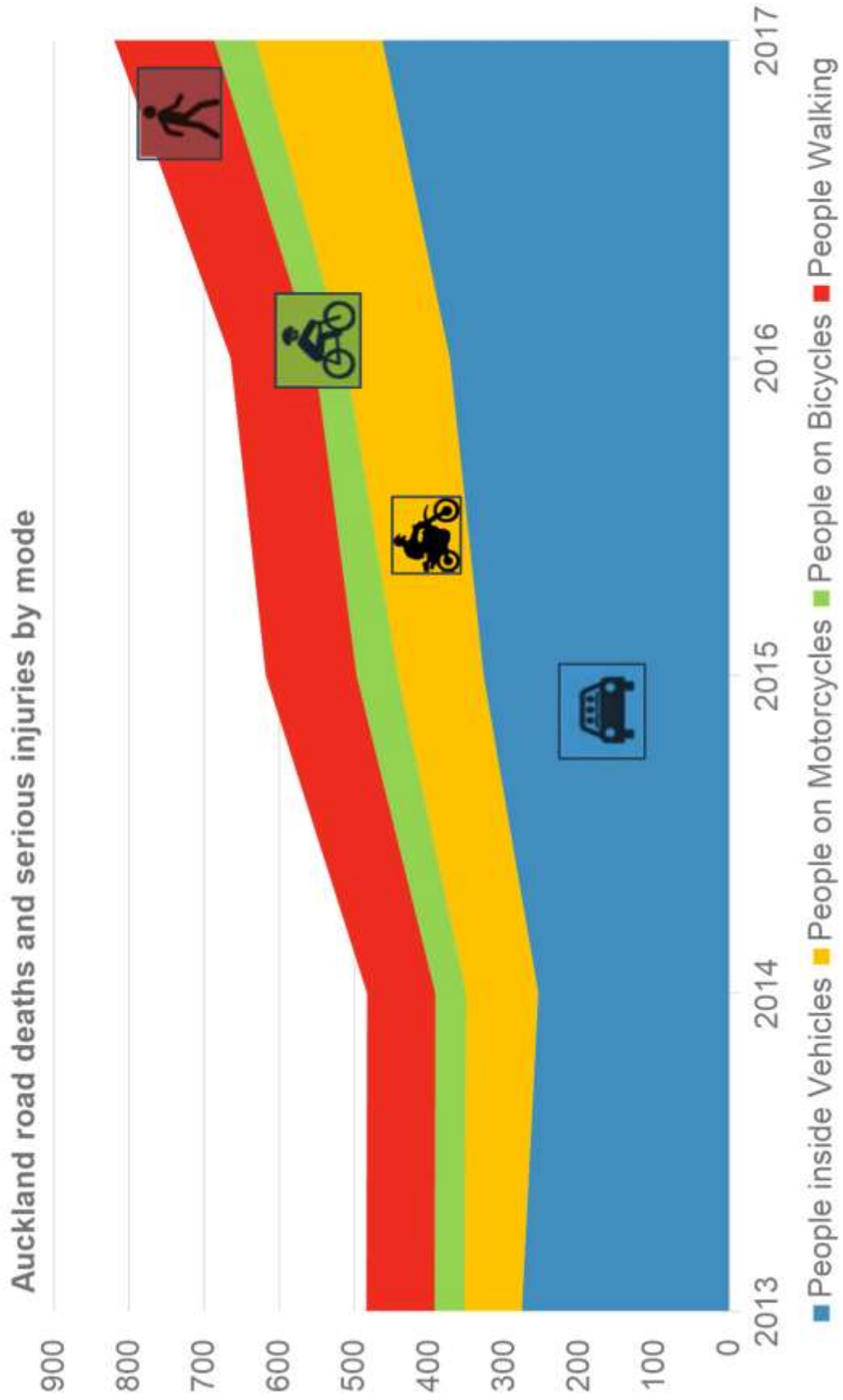




# Auckland faces a road safety crisis

## Safe System/Vision Zero a paradigm shift



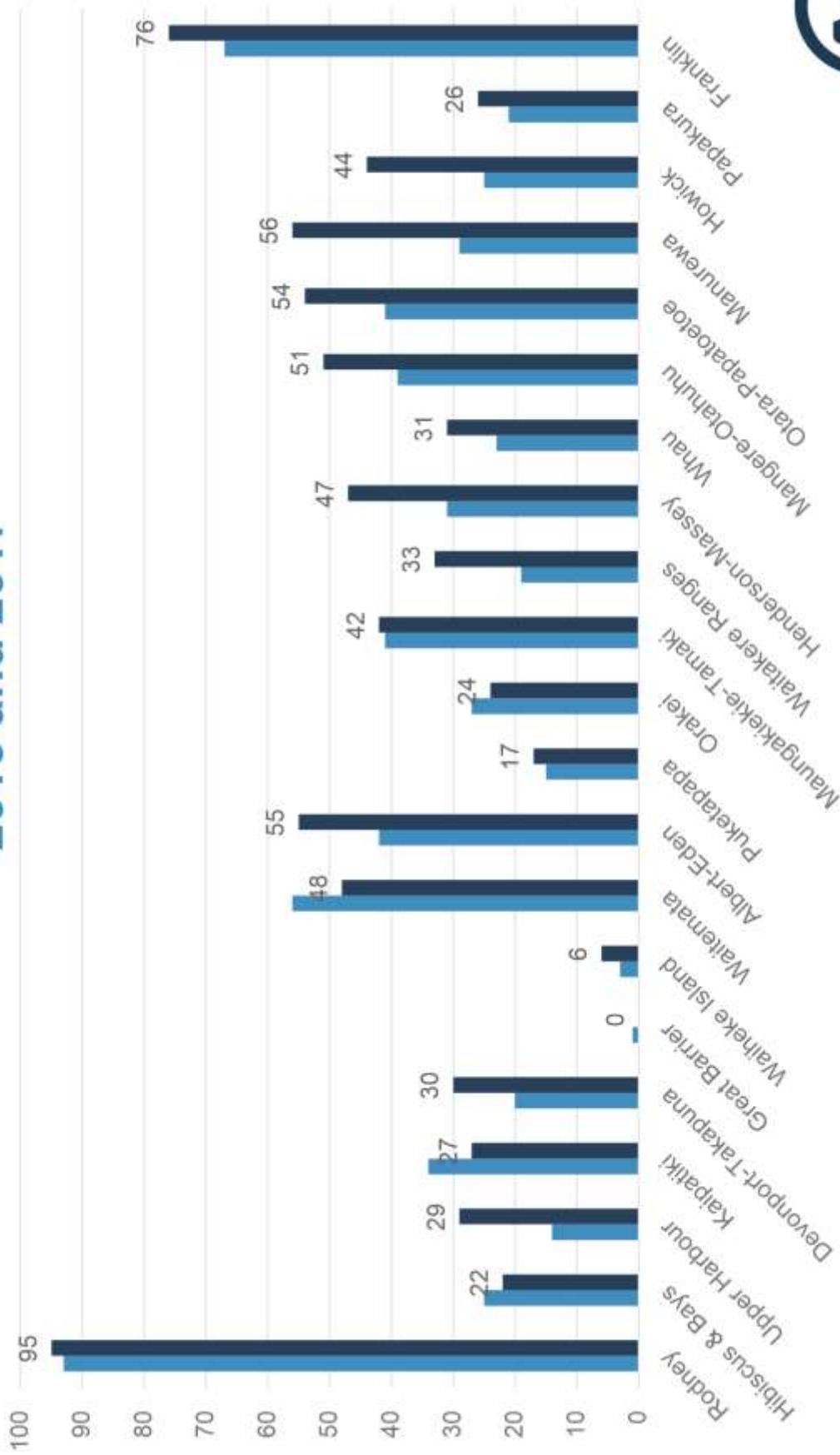

■ 2016 DSI ■ 2017 DSI

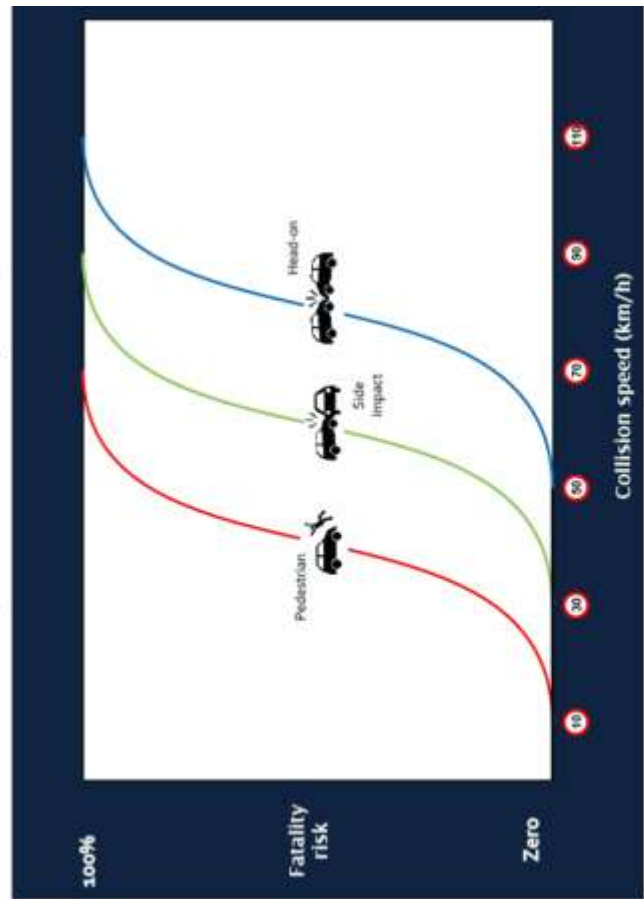






Small changes in speed have a large impact on fatality risk  
Fatality risk for three crash types over a range of impact travel speeds

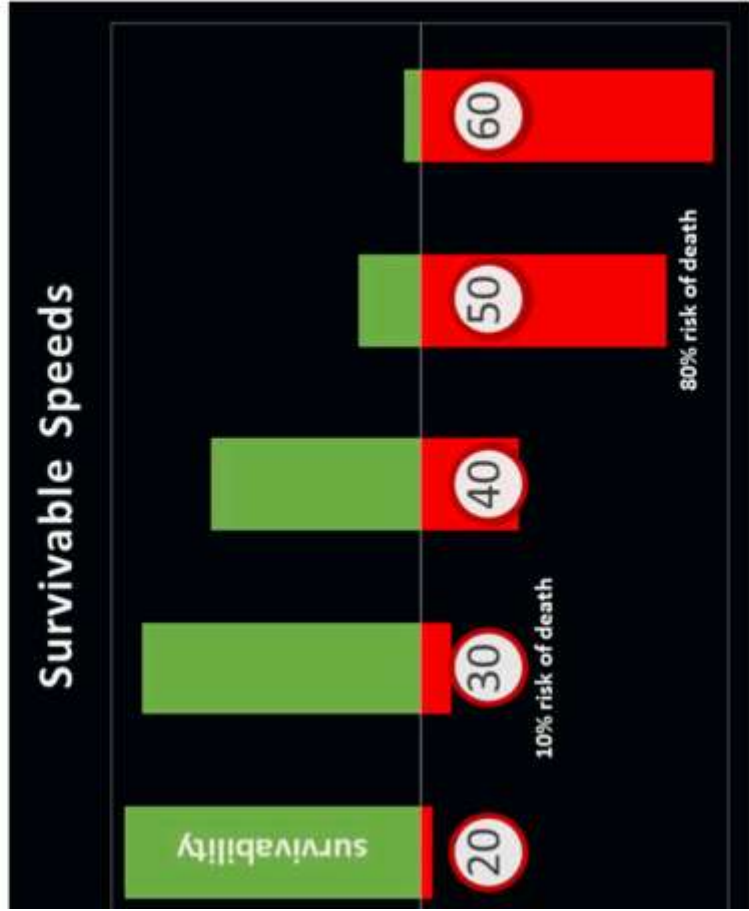



Community is Connected, Active and

- ❖ Wellbeing Network established to develop and enhance community wellbeing.  
Three identified priorities and steering groups established:
  - **Community Hub**
  - **Youth Development**
  - **Community Events**





**Community Hub Partnership** – focus on the establishment of a pop-up community hub

- Includes Future Whangaparāoa, Hibiscus Coast Family Centre Trust, Hub Steering Group (including Steps Forward, HBC Community House, Home and Family Counselling). Hub established, engaging and activating community from March 2018

**Youth Working Group** - focus on developing a youth advisory group/s and one project to meet a need for young people on the Peninsula

- Includes CYC Trust, Youth in Transition, Whangaparāoa Police, Yes Disability and Future Whangaparāoa
- Have developed an RFP to contract a specialist youth advisor to run the project

**Community Events Working Group** – focus on running a series of events to activate communities across the Whangaparāoa Peninsula

- Includes Community Activator, Future Whangaparāoa and Future Whangaparāoa Business
- Running community events from Hub and have developed a schedule of events for 2018

## Economies are Strong and

❖ Future Whangaparāoa Business established to support, connect and advocate for local business. Primary activities include:

- Whangaparāoa Business Network
- Business Advice and Co-working
- Job Training and Employment Support
- Community Events

## Business Network, Business Mentoring Community Events

- **Whangaparāoa Business Network** – focus on providing networking events and informative workshops to local business
  - Three held in 2017/18 year
- **Business Advice and Co-working** – focus on providing mentoring and connection opportunities for local business people
  - Business advice sessions held weekly at the Hub
  - Co-working days held fortnightly at the Hub
- **Job Training and Employment Support** – focus on identifying current job training and employment opportunities available and potential initiatives for future development
- **Community Events** – focus on ensuring local business is involved in, supports and benefits from local community events
