Summary:	Benefit advocates are present at Waitematā Community Law Centre on Wednesday afternoons. Advocates provide support and advice to people/ whānau who are having difficulties with Work and Income. With this support and advice, people/whānau are able to access their full and correct entitlements from Work and Income. This means that people/ whānau are able to feed their children, access or retain housing, and obtain essential household items (beds, fridges, washing machines etc.). Other essential things include buying school uniforms, computers for study, clothing and bedding to ensure children have an opportunity to achieve their full potential by ameliorating the effects of poverty. Reducing the effects of poverty improves community well-being and safety.

Our advocacy service helps thousands of people across Auckland access their full entitlements at Work and Income. We have dozens of volunteer advocates who are trained to help whānau meet their essential and immediate survival needs. This includes having food, shelter, beds, and other essential household goods. It also means having the ability to pay essential costs such as rent and power. Having benefit advocacy available at the Waitematā Community Law Centre on

Wednesdays gives people the opportunity to access support to obtain essential financial assistance from Work and Income.

ETOC (Education Outside of Classroom) camps are a wonderful opportunity to challenge and inspire our tamariki. Three outcomes of this project are to:

1. Promote physical and emotional wellbeing in a challenging and fun environment.
2. Allow all our kura whānau to have the option to participate in this camp regardless of economic situation.
3. Develop student engagement and participation through ETOC
 1. Children talking and writing about their camp experiences passionately.
 2. 100% participation of Year 5 & 6 children attending camp regardless of their circumstances.
 3. Students demonstrating their motivation to participate enthusiastically in camp activities throughout the 4 days.

Henderson North School works hard to develop whānaungatanga within our community. Camps are expensive to run, and we want to make it as affordable as possible for all our families, therefore our staff and tamariki have been fundraising throughout the year. Some whānau cannot afford the fees required, so the school is seeking this grant help get these kids to camp.

At our camp students will develop mahi tahi, teamwork, and learn to take responsibility for both themselves and the environment. They will get opportunities to participate in challenging and fun activities they wouldn't usually have access to, creating lifelong memories for our tamariki.

Our objective is to encourage mental and emotional resilience and help prevent youth suicide, teen pregnancy, bullying, drug and alcohol abuse and low self-esteem, some of the key issues NZ young people are struggling with. For this project, Attitude presenters will visit six Henderson and Massey high schools as required during 2019 to deliver presentations and handbooks to approximately 7100 students.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

The Attitude programme develops young people by teaching them how to make good decisions and inspiring them to implement these decisions. We help them focus on their strengths; we equip them to engage with and solve problems, cultivate healthy self-esteem and good mental health, recover from setbacks, and understand and improve relationships. With good emotional and resilience skills, teenagers are less likely to fall into substance abuse, self-harm and dangerous relationships. Students are empowered to make informed choices and negotiate their teenage years in a safe and positive way and so become positive contributors to society.

- Through improved decision making our programmes encourage students to positively contribute towards making their community a safe and friendly environment for all, irrespective of age, ethnicity or ability.
- Volunteering is promoted, and students are encouraged to become involved in the caring and building of their community and its members.
- Young people are given insights into their own family dynamics and provided keys on how to get on better with their families.
- Attitude educates young people on the physical and emotional benefits of living an active healthy lifestyle.
- Equality and understanding are key messages we deliver.

Attitude relies on feedback from students, teachers, professionals and members of the community to confirm that our work is beneficial to the community.

- Consistently positive feedback and references from school teachers and principals help us to know that our message is having a positive impact on young people in the schools we visit as they see changes in students' attitudes and behaviour
- Informal feedback from students via our Facebook page lets us know students' reactions and outcomes of our talks as they share comments and stories of change
- Our ongoing formal evaluation, combined with regular teacher interviews and evaluations, confirms the positive impact we are having on the lives of young people in a measurable way. (Please see our most recent evaluation summary and references attached.)

Amount requested: \$2,000

Requesting grant for: For this project, Attitude presenters will visit six Henderson and Massey high schools as required during 2019 to deliver life skills, mental health and wellbeing presentations along with the accompanying Handbooks.

We request funding from Auckland Council Henderson-Massey Local Board as a contribution towards the cost of 52 presentations requested by high schools (@\$200 each, excl. GST) and the provision of Hardwired (drug and alcohol) handbooks for all Year 10 students.

If part funded, how would you make up the difference:

Attitude will ask schools to contribute a koha towards the cost of presentations however budgets are often limited. Based on school contributions last year we estimate we will receive a total of \$2000.00 towards this project. Attitude will also apply to all possible funders in the district to fund the remaining expenses. If we are unsuccessful in raising enough funds for the full project, Attitude will still visit the schools however we will deliver fewer presentations than the number requested by staff.

Cost of participation: If we are unable to fundraise for all costs we ask schools to donate a koha for our presentations, though as school's budgets are limited this is not always possible.

It was reported in the Auckland Star as being ' a very

There are links to Mr Cranwell in Cranwell park and remnants of his orchard continue in the Pear trees there. The house was very badly damaged in a fire in the 1970's and has been a long labour of love for twenty years. I feel that having this one, very unusual, two-storey house still standing is extremely important in the long run for Henderson to continue to have a sense of tangible historic architecture.

Our projects have included: a compost bin and garden seating for our local community hubs, worm farm frames for community gardens, a mud kitchen for a local kindergarten.

3. The wider community benefit from our public activities, which have included: Massey Maker Kids workshops at the Massey Community hub, hands on activities at various community treasure hunts and Neighbours Days, Massey library holiday programmes, kitset car making at many events.
