

Project Name	Youth leadership programme workshop for the Manukau Harbour.
Local board	Manukau Harbour Forum member local boards: Franklin, Māngere-Ōtāhuhu, Manurewa, Maungakiekie-Tāmaki, Ōtara-Papatoetoe, Papakura, Puketāpapa, Waitākere Ranges and Whau.
Project Description	Students from Auckland secondary schools come together on location at Manukanuka o te Hoturoa marae to learn about sustainability issues on the Manukau Harbour. Students develop leadership skills, knowledge of sustainability and gain competence in Māori perspectives to enable them to initiate authentic action projects for the Manukau area.
Project Benefits	<p>This project will provide the following benefits:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Raise awareness of the Manukau Harbour with youth and support them to act or change behaviour to improve the sustainability of the local community and surrounding area • Develop action plans that align with Manukau Harbour Forum objectives, to improve water quality and biodiversity, reduce waste, develop community engagement, enhance local areas and develop sustainable enterprise schemes.
Local Board Plan Outcome/Key objectives	Each of the Manukau Harbour Forum member local boards have key outcomes relating to the protection and enhancement of the natural environment.
Regional policies and priorities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Auckland Plan 2050 includes the direction to “ensure Auckland’s natural environment and cultural heritage is valued and cared for”. • Environment, including coastal management, water quality, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure projects are among the spending priorities of the 10-Year Budget 2018-2028. • Protecting and enhancing the natural environment are among the key outcomes of the Local Board Plans 2017 published by the member boards of the Manukau Harbour Forum.
Budget 2018/2019	<p>Option A: For a budget allocation of \$10,000 the project will deliver the following activities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Workshop catering • Venue hire (choices will be limited by available budget) • Transport • Mana whenua services (extent of services limited by available budget) • Snorkelling experience <p>Option B: For a budget allocation of \$15,000 the project will deliver the following activities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Workshop catering • Venue hire (preferred choice of marae) • Transport • Mana whenua services • Snorkelling experience • T-Shirts

Timeline	This project will be delivered in quarter three and quarter four.
Feasibility	This project will be delivered by the Sustainable Schools team in partnership with mana whenua, the Department of Conservation, Parks Sports and Recreation, Watercare and Auckland Airport. Mātauranga Māori will be procured.
Risks and Dependencies	<p>The success of this project is dependent upon:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Getting schools on board with the programme. • Keeping students involved for ongoing mentoring and project support • Having enough students from the Manukau Harbour Forum member local board areas. • Sufficient time for Sustainable Schools Advisors to coordinate and facilitate the programme. <p>To mitigate these risks the Sustainable Schools Advisors have actively recruited local schools and have also extended recruitment to marae and TSI for more local youth to participate.</p>
Māori outcomes	Workshops will include the concepts of kaitiakitanga and Te Ao Māori, and students will develop competence in understanding Māori perspectives.
Māori engagement	This project is delivered in partnership with mana whenua from Makaurau Marae.
Public engagement	Medium
