#### Identified need:

Yes - we have run Bright Ideas for nine months now and have established a keen audience, usually gaining at least 20 attendees in each session. Feedback from the community is that the sessions are extremely valuable for those who are working as artists in East Auckland as it gives them the opportunity to connect with others and learn about how others similar to themselves work. It has been a brilliant opportunity for our creative community to hear about others experiences and inspire each other.

#### Identified community outcomes:

Bright Ideas achieves the following community outcomes:

- 1) It provides an opportunity to learn from each other and celebrate the diverse talents of the community while connected with a range of interesting people.
- 2) It provides people a different and unique opportunity to feel part of their community. The events are open for all and there are no barriers for people to participate. We instil a casual atmosphere that our audience responds to. Everyone is welcome and treated equally.
- 3) It provides our talented local art community the platform to showcase their work and ideas to an appreciative audience. Many use the event to talk about various projects they are working on, helping our local creative community.

### Community benefits

#### Identified need:

Eastern Stars Band provides musical education to children, youth and their families in the community, particularly underprivileged community members lacking access to musical education because of their financial circumstances, despite their significant musical abilities.

A large portion of the Band's members are immigrants from different national and ethnic backgrounds, for whom the Band is a space not only to express themselves, but also to become familiar with New Zealand's language and culture.

Through its operations in East Auckland for over two decades, Eastern Stars Band has been acutely aware of the desire for musical education in the community, the level of talent evident in young community members, and the problems with access to musical education in the community.

#### Identified community outcomes:

Eastern Stars Inc meets community needs both through the service we provide, and through our function in the wider community.

Most of our Band's members and participants have significant musical skills and abilities, but no avenue to express them in as there are no community groups or organisations that offer musical training in an informal communal atmosphere.

The success is clearly seen by the numbers of people who attend our concerts. Our last concert there was between 350 and 400 people who attended.

To provide a safe place where children and families can meet together and enjoy the playing of music for their own enjoyment and the enjoyment of the general public. That equates to 20% of the overall dog bites reported in NZ per annum. From research overseas it has shown that the best way to reduce dog bites is through education. In 2014 The Animals & Society Institute (MI USA) stated - "Varied kinds of studies strongly suggest that the most effective way to decrease dog aggression in general may be simply to educate people"

By educating children and teachers on how to behave around dogs and understanding why dogs behave the way they do; we can assist in reducing the number of dog bites or incidents that may occur. Through our programs we can teach children how to stay safe around dogs. This will bring down the number of dog bites and help to ensure less incidents occur in the future.
