#### Identified need:

We have served this community for 25 years, demonstrating a positive need, receiving near full house attendance regularly, to the 4 - 5 symphonic concerts we present per year.

#### Identified community outcomes:

The orchestra begins rehearsals at Te Tuhi Centre for the Arts in Pakuranga on November 10, working with MSO Musical Director Uwe Grodd and extraordinary NZ pianist Michael Houstoun over the course of 7 rehearsals to bring this vibrant programme to the audiences and communities of Manukau.

Throughout this period, the volunteer community musicians work closely with professional musicians in the MSO's 'Players as Mentors' programme, whereby the orchestra is able to leverage the skill and talent of these professional players to educate talented and keen community musicians as they explore a full symphony orchestra experience. In this way the benefits are both internal and external; in that the MSO deliver a high-quality product to their audiences whilst further developing the capacity, skill and talent of the community musicians that are the foundation of the ensemble therefore assisting the development of the organisation as an artistic entity.

### Community benefits

#### Identified need:

Since the establishment of NZDC in 2012, we have dedicated ourselves in connecting all walks of lives using dance as the art form. In 2017, we delivered to over 64 school workshops, 16 school performances, and over 190 public workshops and classes; engaging with a total of 7,536 youth and seniors through our Youth & Community Programme. We have positively influenced the lives of many and supported heaps of young dancers with scholarships to attend our Youth Seasonal School delivered by professional dancers. We believe with support from the local boards, we will be able to continue shaping the artistic landscape of Aotearoa while connecting with the communities of Tāmaki Makauaru.

#### Identified community outcomes:

The key outcome of this project are to encourage inclusiveness and increase participation from members of our community. By bringing this project to schools, we would be able to engage with young people while educating them about Māori culture and tradition in the context of Matariki. We

hope to take young people across Tāmaki Makauaru and our audience on a journey of cultural exploration and deepen understanding of the Māori connection to the land of Aotearoa.

As part of NZDC's 2019 Youth & Community Engagement Strategy, 'Matariki for Tamariki' focuses on connecting with youth, families and different communities across Tāmaki-Makaurau. It is a collaboration with Māori dancer/choreographer Sean MacDonald (Ngāti Kahungunu, Ngāti Raukawa) to create a whole whānau work - 'Kaleidoscope' - that honours Papatūānuka then continues on celestial pathways and navigation by way of the stars of our tupuna through to individual characteristics of the Matariki stars. The work embraces Māori belief and the influences of Matariki stars on the landscape of Aotearoa and the people of this land.

Integrated with NZDC's Tāmaki Tour which is delivered annually to schools across Tāmaki-Makaurau, Sean's work 'Kaleidoscope' will be performed, followed by a creative workshop where students will be able to contribute towards the developing work based on their interpretation of Matariki. Embracing creative thoughts of students across Tāmaki-Makaurau, Sean will create the final 45 mins choreographic work that illustrates his definition of Matariki reflecting past, present and future. We believe that young people are active members of our community and not future participants. The idea of engaging with local schools is to involve students and encourage active participation to celebrate the vibrant arts and cultural scene of our shared community.

### **Community benefits**

#### **Identified need:**

Through our long history we know the obstacles people who are blind or have low vision face to access books and information in their communities and public libraries, and their subsequent need for talking books.

We carry out annual surveys and record loan statistics to ensure that funds spent to expand our collection are justified and will deliver meaningful results. Our surveys and feedback consistently highlight that even though the library is the most highly rated of Blind Foundation services our members want a wider and more current range of titles.

In the last twelve months clients have made 380,870 loans of talking books. This number is increasing year on year. Our really keen readers are running out of titles!

### Identified community outcomes:

Maintaining and adding to our digital talking book collection increases the quality of our collection and service. This has the following community outcomes:

- people who are blind or have low vision enjoy our collection of talking books and as a result feel included with society and less limited by their vision loss. Therefore they are more confident and likely to connect and engage with their community.
- as people who are blind or have low vision engage more with their communities, more members understand the challenges of vision loss and how they can provide support to those who are experiencing it.
- communities become stronger, better connected, more caring and more inclusive for all.

There are 208 Blind Foundation clients who are blind or have severe vision loss living in the Howick area. One of the major challenges these Kiwis face is finding accessible opportunities for recreation and entertainment.

Enjoying leisure time is key to maintaining mental and emotional health and continuing to live a fulfilled life without limits, but for Blind Foundation clients the options to do so independently are limited.

Talking books are a fantastic source of recreation and entertainment for community members with low or no vision. ### Community benefits

#### Identified need:

It was a need for information, education and support that first led to the establishment of Parkinson's New Zealand over 30 years ago. Without a cure and little medical advancement, our services are still needed. New Zealand's ageing population means demand for our services will only grow. A 2017 study by the New Zealand Brain Research Institute predicts that the number of people with Parkinson's in New Zealand will double in the next 25 years. Other indicators for the need for our services are:

- Engagement with our service has nearly tripled in the last 5 years;
- Annual client satisfaction and service evaluation surveys have told us that our services are vital; and
- Stakeholder engagement and feedback.

### Identified community outcomes:

Three outcomes we want to achieve that will benefit people engaging with our service are:

1. Enhanced community participation by people living with Parkinson's and their carers through increased involvement in a growing range of peer support groups.
2. Improved physical health and mental well-being resulting in reduced isolation through connection with peers at support groups.  
Within this, we want to see increased levels of confidence and self-esteem for people living with Parkinson's through positive interactions with Community Educators. Earlier identification of symptoms and medication side effects also serves to improve people's well-being.
3. Improved self-management, reducing the burden on the public health system. The estimated cost savings to the New Zealand health system of our Parkinson's Community Educator service is between NZD \$1-2 million per year. This is through fewer specialist appointments, avoidable hospital admissions and a reduction in time spent in hospitals. (Source: Parkinson's Australia 2014: Parkinson's Nurse Specialist Paper). Optimised self-management also serves to increase the capacity for paid employment, enabling increased contribution to the local economy. Another flow on benefit of this is that people with Parkinson's are able to stay in their homes longer, aligning our services with the New Zealand Positive Ageing Strategy.
