Over the past 10 years there have been almost 24,000 reported dog bites on children under the age of 14 that require medical attention. That equates to 20% of the overall dog bites reported in NZ per annum. From research overseas, it has shown that the best way to reduce dog bites is through education. In 2014 The Animals & Society Institute (MI USA) stated - "Varied kinds of studies strongly suggest that the most effective way to decrease dog aggression in general may be simply to educate people"

Identified community outcomes:

By educating children and teachers on how to behave around dogs and understanding why dogs behave the way they do; we can assist in reducing the number of dog bites or incidents that may occur. Through our programs we can teach children how to stay safe around dogs. This will bring down the number of dog bites and help to ensure less incidents occur in the future

Community benefits

Identified need:

Prior to the implementation of the Paper4trees programme, schools and preschools were sending paper and cardboard to landfill because they didn't have the infrastructure required to recycle in the classroom. Waste audits in schools have shown that approx. 70% of a school's waste is paper and cardboard, which is a lot of resource to be sending to landfill. The Paper4trees programme was developed to provide that infrastructure, and also provide an incentive to report in how much paper and cardboard they are recycling and therefore diverting from landfill.

Identified community outcomes:

- Students and staff take home the recycling message and set up similar systems within their own homes.
- Some schools donate their plants to local community restoration projects for the whole community to enjoy and benefit from.
- Local businesses, nurseries, transfer stations and recycling contractors also benefit as they are receiving business.
- More native trees are being planted throughout local communities, which attract birds and beautify spaces etc.
- Recycling preserves local landfill space and reduces carbon dioxide in landfill. Recycling is also turned into valuable resource, which prevents natural resources from being depleted.

Paper4trees is a waste minimisation and tree planting programme for schools and preschools. We then we reward them with native trees to plant on their grounds for their efforts which helps protect the local environment.

Community benefits

Identified need:

In response to the school's only playground being demolished 2 years ago, a survey was conducted with the local community to obtain feedback about rebuilding a play facility. There was strong support, particularly for younger people, to use play facilities both during and outside of school hours.

The school achieved over \$60,000 in local fundraising to build the playground, but unfortunately this was only sufficient for a small junior playground. Senior students have no suitable play infrastructure at the school. Also, fundraising from locals has now been exhausted and therefore we now seek grants to help us. A bike track is a lot cheaper and more suitable for seniors.

Identified community outcomes:

Promote a healthy lifestyle for young people.

Teach confidence and bike skills to students, so that they can learn road safety and co-ordination skills in a safe environment.

Create a social hub for our community where they can hang out with families/kids during weekends and after school.

The Kiribati community in Pukekohe is one of the two fast growing Kiribati communities in Auckland with a relatively high proportion of the population below the age of 25 years; estimated number is over 400 people. Pukekohe youth community is well known among Kiribati in Auckland as progressive traditional dancers with special interest in merging traditional with contemporary dance. There is growing interest among youths there to engage and learn the new progressive dance style. One of the obstacles to the groups progress is the lack of a reliable and affordable space/venue where the community can gather and practice on regular basis. In addition to learning dance styles, youths will also participate in the making of different dance costumes that will be held during dance practice sessions.

The project will cover venue expenses for 30 sessions that will allow the community the best opportunity to do many other art activities including practice their dance, build and share skills, make dance costumes, perform art related activities such as sewing, and weaving. Pukekohe youth community has been identified to exhibit Kiribati art at the Auckland War Memorial Museum special project in September 2018.

Māngere-Otāhuhu

Youth livelihood and engagement is the focus of the Kiribati community in Mangere. The community is concerned with the growing unhealthy eating habits among their youths over the past several years. Obesity is now visible among their youth. The community wants to engage their youths in healthier lifestyle activities so that they can become healthy future leaders and citizens and be able to contribute positively to their community. Youth leaders have started an informal fitness programme comprising sports and diet control for the past year but have not made real impact due to limited resources.

The project Healthy Eating Healthy Action (HEHA) is proposed to provide adequate resources and reliability to the programme. This will be planned as part of the West Fono ongoing Auckland wide fitness programme which should make the project attractive and fun. The programme involves 4-6 nutrition workshops and weekly sports (basketball and volleyball) in their local gym in Mangere for 10 sessions. The HEHA project will cover venue costs for sports only. Other costs such as nutrition workshops, resources and volunteer allowance are covered under different grant source. By promoting healthier lifestyles for youths, the project will improve their engagements in their community matters and will give them confidence to have a voice and contribute positively to community's affairs.

Ōtara-Papatoetoe

Create opportunities for interactions between young and old

The project seeks funds to support venue costs where Kiribati youth from the area can come together with older members weekly for 10 weeks to learn from each other in particular cultural values. Interaction between youths and older members of the community create opportunities for our young members to learn traditional skills, and cultural values and how they can be applied to promote peaceful and respectful living and community wellbeing etc; while older members can learn and

become more aware about the problems their kids are going through at school and in the general public e.g bullying, alcohol and drugs. A community interaction provides a conductive environment where youths feel comfortable and confident to discuss their problems with other adults and are more receptive to advice. Youths sometimes find it easier to discuss their issues with other adults outside their own families.

The project will improve bonds between youths and older members, strengthen the overall community, and will make the community a happy and safer place.

Waitākere Ranges

 Organise community events and activities that celebrate our diverse local identities and bring people together

The project is about promoting cross cultural development between Kiribati youths from West Auckland and Tuvalu youths from Ranui in cultural dance and sports. The project seeks funding support for sports venue only to cover 10 weeks in the Waitakere College sports gymnasium. The venue will allow Kiribati and Tuvalu youths to share space together and create opportunities for sport and cultural diversity.

Supporting cross cultural development is important for youths in West Auckland where Kiribati and one Tuvalu community have identified common interests in youth sports and dance. The two communities have formalised their combined membership in the West Auckland Kiribati Association (WAKA) as a starting point for supporting their youths cross cultural development initiative.

The medium term goal for this cross cultural development project in WAKA will be to establish a strong youths sports and cultural team that will participate in the ongoing Kiribati regional youth competitions in sports and culture in Auckland. It will also improve the general wellbeing of youths and leadership skills that will have positive impact on the WAKA community.

Community benefits

Identified need:

It was a need for information, education and support that first led to the establishment of Parkinson's New Zealand over 30 years ago. Without a cure and little medical advancement, our services are still needed. New Zealand's ageing population means demand for our services will only grow. A 2017 study by the New Zealand Brain Research Institute predicts that the number of people with Parkinson's in New Zealand will double in the next 25 years. Other indicators for the need for our services are:

- Engagement with our service has nearly tripled in the last 5 years;
- Annual client satisfaction and service evaluation surveys have told us that our services are vital; and
- Stakeholder engagement and feedback.

Identified community outcomes:

Three outcomes we want to achieve that will benefit people engaging with our service are:

1. Enhanced community participation by people living with Parkinson's and their carers through increased involvement in a growing range of peer support groups. 2. Improved physical health and mental well-being resulting in reduced isolation through connection with peers at support groups. Within this, we want to see increased levels of confidence and self-esteem for people living with Parkinson's through positive interactions with Community Educators. Earlier identification of symptoms and medication side effects also serves to improve people's well-being. 3. Improved self-management, reducing the burden on the public health system. The estimated cost savings to the New Zealand health system of our Parkinson's Community Educator service is between NZD \$1-2 million per year. This is through fewer specialist appointments, avoidable hospital admissions and a reduction in time spent in hospitals. (Source: Parkinson's Australia 2014: Parkinson's Nurse Specialist Paper). Optimised self-management also serves to increase the capacity for paid employment, enabling increased contribution to the local economy. Another flow on benefit of this is that people with Parkinson's are able to stay in their homes longer, aligning our services with the New Zealand Positive Ageing Strategy.

Community benefits

Identified need:

Over the last year, the number whanau coming through our Whanau Centre increased by 182%. On average, 70% of those who come through Whanau Centre will be experiencing a lack of food and will be referred to access our foodbank, 90% of which stated that the lack of food was due to finances. This growing need saw us support a record 8840 whanau in the 2017/18 financial year with food parcels. We have observed the need for a Free Store and more financial mentoring sessions as a response to the hunger crisis from the increasing levels of

engagement in our services and from these trends we do not anticipate this need slowing or ceasing.

Identified community outcomes:

Our financial mentoring sees debt reduction is one of the key outcomes achieved. In a cohort of 50 whanau in 2017 through engaging with VisionWest Financial Mentoring, household debt was reduced by \$350,000, an average of 1/3 of each family's household debt. By increase our capability to deliver more sessions; we will see these amazing outcomes increase accordingly. 70% of the individuals who access Financial Mentoring are women with dependent children. In 2017, we saw over 200 children directly benefit from debt reduction.

Paataka Kai will assist in reducing the effects of the hunger crisis and food wastage in West Auckland by providing free food to those in need through the Paataka Kai free store. This way of distributing food gives whanau the opportunity to shop and choose their own food from daily changing stock rather. This model of food distribution allows greater levels of self-determination and individual agency in engaging with social support.

Paataka Kai provides a platform for whanau can volunteer, engage and give back to their community. This includes providing the support needed to maintain, train and support the volunteers in their Paataka Kai volunteer commitments. These results will all increase accordingly over the next year.

VisionWest Community Trust has been providing social support services in West Auckland, with a main focus on Henderson-Massey for 30 years. Approximately 40% of the whanau we work with through our Whanau Services reside in Henderson/Massey board area. VisionWest is long-term recognised community development organisation that measures our effectiveness on how well we support our whanau to see positive transformation in their lives and build healthy communities. Through our financial mentoring service we see 90% of the whanau who complete an intervention with us report positive, long-term changes and differences to their lives. Our Paataka Kai project, in a similar way, enables our Whanau to see opportunities for community engagement, increased access to basic living needs and personal development grow.

There are several barriers that have been identified by women that hamper their ability to acquire healthy living knowledge, independent living and engage in physical activity.

Information from the Hillary Commission, Sports and Recreation Survey does show however, that men and women from other ethnic groups are least likely to be knowledgeable about healthy living, compared to Maori, European, and Pacific people.
