Summary:	Working with schools and teachers we deliver age appropriate education programmes on school premises to approximately 30 pupils at a time. We start with Three Golden Rules and then, depending on the age of the children we discuss different scenarios which help the children to develop empathy by using "how would you feel if...". We created Jelly and our other cartoon characters to make the programmes more relatable for children and make it easier for them to remember what the programmes teach.

Promotion:	When we receive funding, we promote on Social Media that we have received funding from the Local Board. We then contact local schools letting them know that funding has come through and organise with them to go in and deliver the course. We encourage the schools to put it into their newsletter so that it gets parents and caregivers talking. We are also approaching the local newspapers to see if they would be interested in doing a feature. The logo from the board is put on our website. A photograph with the local board logo added on is posted on our Facebook page.		

Community benefits

Identified need:

Over the past 10 years there have been almost 24,000 reported dog bites on children under the age of 14 that require medical attention. That equates to 20% of the overall dog bites reported in NZ per annum. From research overseas, it has shown that the best way to reduce dog bites is through education. In 2014 The Animals & Society Institute (MI USA) stated - "Varied kinds of studies strongly suggest that the most effective way to decrease dog aggression in general may be simply to educate people"

Identified community outcomes:

By educating children and teachers on how to behave around dogs and understanding why dogs behave the way they do; we can assist in reducing the number of dog bites or incidents that may occur. Through our programs we can teach children how to stay safe around dogs. This will bring down the number of dog bites and help to ensure less incidents occur in the future.

By educating the children and teachers in our community we are actively contributing to areas such as growing community spirit and engagement, safer communities, teaching children empathy by getting them to recognise animals as sentinel beings, helping children to learn and teach other family members and offering support and assistance to teachers to allow them to have more confidence and understanding when they are taking the children out of school grounds and into public areas where they may encounter dogs. We are passionate about making a difference in the community by reducing dog bites.

Community benefits

Identified need:

The Kura has expressed the wish to have this exhibition. This has been supported by WAVES, and by other stakeholders.

Identified community outcomes:

The exhibition will provoke thought and discussion on the nature of family violence, and the causes that contribute to it. For example, The Artworks have been created by young, mostly Māori, people based on what they may experience in their own lives, in their Whānau, with their friends or in their neighbourhood. The focus is not so much on actual acts of family violence, but much more on the situations that foster it. Students clearly perceive those situations also as a form of violence, that goes well beyond the actual crime statistics. For example, the fridge door that opens on "no food here", or that shows an overdue bill or eviction notice on its front, provokes a lot of thought. Exhibiting these works in public spaces allows for discussion, and for diverse people in the community to be exposed to perceptions that may be coming from a totally different angle than their own. Our proposal hence also contributes to three of the Local Board funding priorities by making mataawaka aspirations and needs more widely known, but also by embracing and valuing diversity and difference, and by using community facilities.

The exhibition will be of artworks that have been created last year as part of WAVES' "Behind Closed Doors". Identified need:

One in four New Zealand children under the age of 18 live in households with three or more risk factors which potentially indicate that the child is facing adversity. Six per cent (24,000 children in Auckland) live in high-risk households with five or more risk factors. Our National Office and Auckland branch receive daily enquiries from parents and social support agencies seeking positive role models for young people.

Their goal is to provide quality, committed mentoring wherever there is a need. With over 100 years of history and operations in 13 countries, Big Brothers Big Sisters has become known for delivering best practice in youth mentoring.

The programme itself is based on the simplicity and the power of friendship; but it is the strong organisation infrastructure, the programme delivery model, and the research to back it that makes the Big Brothers Big Sisters name synonymous with quality programme delivery and best practice worldwide. Independent research has shown that the relationship between youth and their Big Brother/Big Sister has a direct and measurable impact on their lives. Independent studies find children with Big
