Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

For every year that we visit children in their schools, we can have a positive effect on health choices regarding food, nutrition & exercise by showing them the short & long-term effects of making good choices.

Nearly 100,000 children aged 2-14s (12.3%) were obese. This has increased by 8.4% since 2006/2007.

Children living in the most socio-economically deprived neighbourhoods were 2.5 times as likely to be obese as children living in the least deprived neighbourhoods, after adjusting for age, sex and ethnic differences.

The need for our programme is more relevant today in our community than it has ever been, particularly because we have a rapidly growing population which includes 14% of NZ's child population & 42% of NZ's decile 1 & 2 schools.

We are invited back into schools on an annual/bi-annual basis. There has been a surge in schools also requesting additional visits/teaching support when a problem arises and/ or schools wish to use our expertise practical knowledge & skills e.g. cyber safety, digital citizenship, positive puberty.

By the end of Year 8, all our Manurewa students will be:

PROUD of their identity

EMPOWERED to make healthy choices

CONNECTED & engaged with the world

CURIOUS & have inquiring minds

RESPECTFUL of themselves, others & the environment

1) The classroom teacher of every student we teach are invited to evaluate the lesson they have just observed across a range of subjects from the engagement of our educator with the students, our educational resources, content of the lesson, age-appropriateness of lesson etc. All results are gathered & assessed by Research NZ.

2) Being invited back to teach at the school on a regular basis

3) Feedback, retainment & building of knowledge from seeing the same students as they move through the school

Our sessions contribute greatly towards an involved & connected Manurewa community by:

1) providing 545 workbooks that 545 students can take home & share their awareness & knowledge on key health & nutrition areas with their families that include follow-up activities to help cement positive changes that can be made

2) offering a parent session at every school we visit so further in-depth questions can be asked & practical tips given eg meal plans, seasonal/cheaper eating, how to recycle more in the home, cyber-safety

3) being pro-active in improved attitudes towards healthier behaviours - giving many examples to students & parents about free & easy activities they can do together to increase their participation in sport, leisure & recreation activities = less time sitting down on technology & increased family time

With 37% of our students in Manurewa identifying as Maori, it is paramount to us that Te Reo is highlighted & used in our classes. Our teachers continually update their resources via their on-going training & personal development.

Promoting SmokeFree:

'Substances' is one of the five core subjects we teach to intermediate students. We discuss & roleplay the decision-making processes they may come across & go through when seeing their friends & peers smoke or they are offered a variety of substances to smoke. We talk about the effects smoking has on your brain, body, finances & making decisions. A Pull Apart Torso - full medical school teaching standards (with 28 parts) is used to illustrate points.

Latest research is used from all health sectors in our lessons.

We are the largest external programme provider working in schools and are proud of the positive trend in the reduced rate of binge drinking, smoking, bullying and marijuana use amongst NZ youth.

Cost of participation: The cost is \$17.92 per student. We charge schools a nominal fee of \$5 for primary school students age 5 - 11 (receive two lessons)/ \$7 for intermediate students age 11- 13 (receive three lessons), however if a school indicates that the visit cannot proceed due to this charge, our Board has given us a mandate to waive the fee to ensure that no child misses these important health & nutrition life lessons.

Identified community outcomes:

The main community outcomes of this project are inclusion, confidence-building, and community participation for children in at-risk areas. By providing a programme where children of all means can participate and be included, this will help build a sense of community belonging and acceptance. Arts 4 Us workshop sessions focus on developing creativity, self-expression, and self-esteem, as well as building social skills and emotional literacy. Sessions support children's overall confidence which enhances their ability to participate in a wider range of community activities, and will bring a renewed sense of vibrancy to the Manurewa and surrounding South Auckland communities.

We will measure these outcomes using feedback forms at the end of each term, along with therapist observation (recorded in session notes) and attendance numbers. We will also seek feedback from community organisations in the local area. If the expected outcomes of the project occur, we would expect to receive positive feedback that participants enjoy coming to the workshop sessions; the sessions have a high level of attendance, which would represent a wide scope of community inclusion; participants able to develop their skills and abilities as per therapist observation; and continued demand for the programme by participants, caregivers/parents, and local community organisations.

Arts 4 Us is a therapeutic and creative community programme that offers at-risk children a chance to engage positively with their community, and to express themselves creatively. 2. Local Manurewa young people engage with the Nathan Homestead in a new way and feel more comfortable about using the space in future
3. Nathan Homestead is opened up for new uses and new communities that may not have previously used the space
4. More of a diverse representation of the community see Nathan Homestead as a place they can access and be part of

If the project is successful, Mixit will expect to have participants from the Manurewa area be interested in attending a follow up Mixit summer intensive programme during January 2019 and onwards into Mixit's next year's term time programme. We will closely monitor attendees and where they come from.

The Nathan Homestead will also have visitors from the local area and other areas who have never previously visited the homestead. We will monitor families and communities who are attracted to come along and see what their young people are doing in this new location with Mixit.

The Nathan Homestead will also have repeat visitors from the local area who initially discovered the homestead via the Mixit workshops. We will keep a record of all visitors and participants as initial

data and use that to help measure the success of the ongoing partnership and activities between Mixit and Nathan Homestead.

Our communities work together to create spaces and places that meet the diverse aspirations of our community, support participation in activities and make new connections

This project continues Mixit's partnership with the Nathan Homestead, begun in 2016. Mixit is an organisation that works with former refugee and migrant youth through the vehicle of creativity in order to increase life skills and promote positive socialisation. Mixit will be running three community workshops at the Nathan Homestead in November 2018. The purpose of these workshops is to creatively engage with the local youth in the community and encourage newcomers from the area to participate alongside the regular Mixit participants. The concept is to give young people an opportunity to enliven the Nathan Homestead and it's grounds by re-imagining and re-framing how they see, experience and reflect this location. Nathan Homestead is interested in increasing the diversity of communities engagement with the centre, people who normally don't see Nathan Homestead as a destination for them. Given Mixits association with former refugee and migrant background youth we are positioned to help broker new connections that could create ongoing participation. Many people from within the Manurewa Board come from refugee and migrant backgrounds and we intend to invite and encourage them to become part of an important community arts facility in their area.
