Identified need:

There is strong demand from Umma Trust to provide services to the Muslim Community in the Auckland region, due to a growing number of Muslim refugees in the area. The underlying core issue here is the need for culturally sensitive service provisions that

remove the uncertainties and difficulties Muslims face in New Zealand. These challenges disproportionately impact women who are often responsible for being the major care providers in refugee and migrant families. Many of the women and children from refugee Muslim communities do not have access to services as other ethnic groups have. They are marginalised and are not free to get services that are catered to their specific language, culture and religious needs.

Identified community outcomes:

With the participation of over 25 youth, children and women, the aim of the project is to increase the connection of refugee women, children and youth in this local area and to enhance understanding of rights and responsibilities in the wider community.

Our outcomes are:

- •Provide a regular, educative programme on health and well being through workshops which will run throughout the year.
- •Educate the community on preventing family violence and parenting.
- •Engage women on outreach activities such as exercise, cooking and driving lessons.

Identified need:

The demand for after-work and weekend counselling sessions in the Mt Eden and the surrounding area is high. We have people on the waiting list who are only able to see professional counsellors outside of their work or school hours. 35% of our work is currently undertaken with a client contribution of \$30 or less. Just under 10% of sessions are delivered at no cost to the client. Depression is one of the most common reasons that people are absent from work or unable to run a home. Sadly, depression occurs in Mt Eden as much as anywhere else in New Zealand.

Identified community outcomes:

The community outcome is being able to provide subsidised, after-hours counselling for children and their families, couples and individuals, with easy access to receive professional help, to talk through their worries and challenges, and not have to worry about the cost. They wouldn't have to despair or struggle to get the help, treatment or resources they need. Pressure on our after-hours clients is driven by many issues, such as an inability to take time off work to receive help, fear their employer may not understand and they may lose their job as a result, or a range of many other negative issues. There is currently no government funding available to support the need for this service. Imagine if we treated mental health as well as we treat physical health. Wouldn't that make an amazing difference in people's lives?

Alignment with local board priorities:

Our community is connected and everyone's involvement is welcomed.

A feeling of being connected and involved is something everyone is vital for a thriving community. There is increasing demand for our after-hours and Saturday counselling services and depression is at a crisis point. Some sessions are offered at no cost based on clients' financial situation. the stresses on those seeking mental health services are regularly reported and our suicide rate has risen for 4 years in a row placing NZ amongst the worst in the world. This places increased demands on those who need a service like Home and Family Counselling.

Community benefits

Identified need:

Youthline has been supporting young people for over 48 years. The need for our services is well established and ongoing.

The helpline is at the heart of our mahi. Last year in the Auckland area we received an estimated 56,300 calls, texts and emails seeking support through our Helpline – with 4,089 being from young people in the Albert Eden area. Almost 1 in 2 present with mental health issues and 1 in 6 presents with suicide issues.

Youthline's Helpline is part of an integrated, wraparound support service for young people in need. For many, picking up the phone, or sending a text, is a courageous act and the start of a journey to personal development and fulfilling potential.

Identified community outcomes:

For many of the vulnerable young people we work with the first contact point with us is through the Helpline, with Cathy's team of volunteer counsellors.

We are then able to link them with the help they need. We offer support services and positive role models to encourage, motivate and inspire young people to reach their full potential and create a resilient community.

We offer a range of personal development programmes. We aim to equip them with skills and insights on how to build self-esteem and improve mental-health, how to actively problem-solve, recover from setbacks and build resilience.

We know that when young people feel connected to their community and valued by others they gain confidence and self-esteem. This in turn provides them with the strength to make improved life decisions, to think about the long term and reduces risk-taking behaviour.

Youthline aims to provide all young people with skills and strategies to help strengthen and improve the relationships they have with the significant adults they interact with, i.e. parents, whānau and teachers. If we can do this then the community in which they live will benefit.

Alignment with local board priorities:

We are all proud to live in Albert-Eden and feel that we belong.

Young people in need who contact Youthline through our Helpline often feel lonely, alone, disengaged and desperate. They often have no sense of belonging to family, school or community.

Youthline has been supporting young people in need for over 48 years. The helpline is an early intervention service operating from a strengths-based, person centred approach. This approach is integral to the delivery of Youthline's Phone, Text and Email Helpline service.

Youthline helpline staff respond to situations of low to high and imminent risk across all mediums of contact, providing a continuum of support and linking service users with other agencies in their own communities. Utilising and promoting Youthline's strengths-based, wrap around approach, Youthline staff are responsible for the quality assessment and management of clients (young people and their families), including those with high and complex needs.

Youthline services equip youth with skills and insights on how to build self-esteem and improve mental-health, how to actively problem-solve, recover from setbacks and build resilience. Counsellors link them with local support services to assist their ongoing development. Through their improved emotional and self-management skills young people are less likely to fall into helplessness, depression, addictive behaviours, dangerous relationships and unemployment.

Research shows that when young people are engaged in community activities, linked with whanau, and given the opportunity to participate feel that they are part of something and encouraged to reach their potential, that risk taking behaviour is reduced. Youthline works inclusively with youth, from those young people who are most vulnerable to youth leaders who are championing change. Our clinical support workers counsel/mentor young people identified as needing one on one support to encourage and inspire them. They aim to understand the strengths and weaknesses of each young person, then identify goals and milestones and develop a plan for successful implementation and progression. By walking beside a young person and providing positive role models Youthline aims to see every young person become a positive contributor to society with a strong sense of belonging.

A special flyer/email will be created to promote the programme to 24 primary and intermediate schools in the Albert Eden area.

Schools are encouraged to promote the TLC visit through their own newsletter, website, letters home to parents. School visits are promoted on the TLC Facebook page.

Students take home with them their Tread Lightly Pledge pack, including the family tread lightly pledge homework activity, information on recycling, bee friendly gardens, soft plastics recycling etc which all act as a further communication tool with families.

There will be special promotion to parents and the wider community regarding the Litter Blitz and whanau workshop events. Media releases will be written, in consultation with the Local Board, regarding the Litter Blitz events.

Community benefits

Identified need:

The demand for the Tread Lightly Caravan continues to grow, with the TLC budgeted to host 8,500 students in 2019. Schools book the Tread Lightly Caravan to support a unit of enquiry or a whole school commitment to sustainability.

The Tread Lightly Drain Game programme is a comprehensive introduction for students on the importance of looking after our waterways and responds to the increasing concern that New Zealanders have regarding water quality.

This programme has been run in the Puketapapa Local Board for the past three years to great success and engagement with schools and the community alike. The UELCT is looking to replicate the same programme and success in the Albert Eden Local Board area.

Identified community outcomes:

An engaged and motivated community (specifically associated with each school), that will have the tools to look at how they live as individuals, as a school community or as a family and how they can make small/easy lifestyle changes that will have a positive effect on the environment.

The culmination of the Tread Lightly visit is the Tread Lightly Pledge project. At the end of the TLC session each student makes a 'pledge" to commit to making one small lifestyle change that will have a positive impact on the environment - such as saying no to plastic bags. A photograph is taken of each child with their pledge as a reminder of that pledge.

Each class teacher is provided with a comprehensive pledge resource pack, including a month long pledge project to track the student's progress to achieving their pledge. Importantly the pledge project also includes a homework activity, requiring students to work with their families to make a "family tread lightly pledge".

The Litter Blitz and whanau workshops, that are also being provided as part of this special programme, will provide additional ways for community engagement and action.

Alignment with local board priorities:

Sustainable practices are encouraged and fostered.

The Tread Lightly goal is to inspire students and families to make changes in their everyday living practices that restore and enhance, rather than degrade our natural environment.

The key concepts that are taught in the Tread Lightly Caravan (TLC) are:

- Our actions and choices have an effect on our environment.
- The rate and way in which we use resources (materials, energy, water) is not sustainable
- Small changes in the way we live will save resources, prevent pollution and protect our biodiversity.

The key concepts taught in the Drain Game programme is that "only rain should go down the (stormwater) drain", the difference between stormwater and wastewater systems, the importance of wetland systems for healthy waterways and the impacts that our behaviours and choices have on our freshwater and marine environments.

The TLC strives to engage with families to affect a wider behaviour change towards sustainable lifestyle. A month long Tread Lightly Pledge project is now offered as part of the TLC to engage students and their families post visit.

Additional activations such as whanau workshops and the Litter Blitz events create further engagement with families and the wider community.

By visiting schools in the Albert Eden Local Board area, the TLC programme will be inspiring behaviour change in students by showing them why we should change our lifestyles and what is at stake - specifically supporting the Albert Eden's LB's outcome "We respect and protect our environment" and priorities
