Activities or services benefit the local board	<p>Individuals/whanau and aiga living with or helping someone with autism are better informed, educated and supported. We aim to improve the quality of life for those who have autism and their whanau. We also encourage those with autism to contribute to their local communities in a positive way. Teachers/teacher aides/carers and other professionals will benefit from our services and be better informed on how to work with a person with autism.</p> <p>The support groups we offer are run from our offices in New North Road. These groups provide an opportunity for those on the spectrum to socialise with each other in a safe, supportive and fun environment. The group members who participate learn basic social skills that individual's on the spectrum struggle with daily. They also become more confident and socially more appropriate in everyday situations.</p>
Organisation aligns with local board grant programme	<p>Our organisation aligns with the Albert-Eden Local Board priorities in that our services enable individual's/whanau to feel connected, proud and secure within their community. We provide a forum for young people and adults with autism to connect with each other in a safe, supportive environment. Our service allows those with autism and their family to feel connected, less isolated and to have a voice within their community. Our service is accessible to individuals of all ages, ethnic groups and socioeconomic status. We encourage diversity and advocate for those living</p>

	<p>with autism and those who support them, fostering a greater sense of connection and security within the community.</p> <p>Our outreach and information services, support groups, training & education programmes enable individuals and whanau to navigate the health & disability systems, contributing to improved community life, connection, safety and participation.</p>
Need for organisation to operate out of premises	<p>Without an office to house staff it would not be possible to provide our valuable services to individuals, whanau and the wider community. These services include one on one appointments with skilled outreach coordinators, support groups, information evenings, and our employment programme. In addition, Autism NZ is the only organisation that works with people of all ages on the spectrum. Autism NZ also creates and delivers autism specific education programmes to the wider community.</p>
Cheaper locations or shared/collaborative spaces	<p>Yes</p> <p>We currently share the building with another organisation, Kidz therapy. We have also looked at other accommodation options however this particular building is central for all our clients and professionals in our community. We are able to run our education programmes from this venue and it is situated close to Morningside Train station. We provide off street parking so there are no extra costs for venue or equipment hire, it is all provided in the lease.</p>

Activities or services organisation offers	We provide our clients with health education, home assessments, case management, primary care services focused on living with and managing asthma & Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD). Our Nurse Educators deliver critically needed help to thousands of families dealing with the everyday challenges of asthma. In partnership with key community organizations, conduct home visits and environmental interventions, and advocates for policy changes to help improve the health quality of life for people with poorly controlled asthma. Our Breathe easy asthma education project for schools and the additional resources assist children, youth, and their families to keep asthma under control, both in and out of the classroom. Our mission is every New Zealander with Asthma & Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease correctly educated, with the knowledge & support to manage their condition effectively. Our vision is to reduce Asthma/COPD related hospital admissions by 50% in 10 years' time.
Activities or services benefit the local board	Asthma New Zealand want people with Asthma & COPD to lead full and active lives, supporting them in their homes, school, or in the workplace. Smoking is the leading cause of COPD. Smoking damages the air sacs, airways, and the lining of the lungs. Our Nurse educators remind our community that smoking - and breathing in other people's smoke - makes asthma & COPD worse over the long term by causing permanent damage to the lungs. It can also trigger asthma symptoms or even an asthma flare up in the short term - 82 per cent of people with asthma tell us that tobacco smoke affects their asthma. Parents need to be very aware that second-hand smoke can increase their child's risk of an asthma attack. It is never too late to quit as their lung function will not continue to decline at such a rapid pace.
Organisation aligns with local board grant programme	We strongly advise our community to Stop smoking and passive smoking to reduce the risk of Asthma and Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) in the community. Giving up smoking can be difficult, but it is one of the most important things that they can do to improve their asthma and their general health, and the health of their families. Once they are less exposed to cigarette smoke they will really notice a difference – they will have fewer asthma symptoms, be less breathless, and need to use fewer asthma medication. We want to reduce asthma & COPD hospitalizations & deaths, reduce hospital emergency department visits and activity limitations among people with asthma & COPD, reduce the number of school or work days missed due to disease and increase the proportion of people with asthma & COPD receiving appropriate care.
Need for organisation to operate out of premises	In New Zealand, over 521,000 people take medication for asthma – this includes an estimated 1 in 7 children and 1 in 9 adults. For children, asthma is one of the most common causes of hospital admissions. On average 90 people die from asthma each year in NZ and on average 1,473 die from COPD in NZ. Asthma & COPD has a huge impact on people's well-being and is a significant economic cost to our society. What we need now is commitment to invest in them. We help throughout Auckland without fanfare, which is why many people with Asthma/COPD realise how crucial this service is in their community. If we are not here to help the people with asthma; District Health Boards will be required to support them through their services and this will cost the country a great deal more.

Cheaper locations or shared/collaborative spaces	No Our Asthma Mobile unit (sponsored by ANZ bank) has specially built garage in the premises. We share the building with Asthma Education Charitable Trust. We conduct Breath Easy (COPD) & NEAT (Nurse Education in Asthma Treatment) education sessions to nurses, pharmacists, physiotherapists and other community health providers. Once a month our own Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease support group members attend the meeting in our premises. Our clients's spirometer testing to be done in our clinic in the premises. So all of these have to consider. We have parking and disability access as well for our older clients who use walkers, scooters

Activities or services benefit the local board	<p>The Albert-Eden local board benefits from having the national documentary organisation located within its area. This means that the screen and wider community sees the local board area as being part of the creative screen sector. The Trust plans and runs its activities from the offices in Mount Eden.</p> <p>Within the area, there are many screen and creative sector business offices, and many of the creative practitioners also live in the area. This congregation of like-minded organisations and individuals create a dynamic creative sector hub,</p> <p>All staff, contractors, interns and volunteers are based at the Doc Edge office.</p>
Organisation aligns with local board grant programme	<p>We share the Council's vision to make Auckland a world-class city that values and cherishes its creative, art and cultural experiences. Our work aligns with the desired Albert-Eden grants outcomes:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Documentary builds bridges of understanding by providing insights into different communities. This is important given the recent events in Christchurch. We need to break down cultural, ethnic and religions barriers and therefore, facilitate proud, connected and secure communities. Providing access to world-class documentaries, digital installations and opportunities to learn storytelling. This allows communities to explore a range of experiences. Showing documentaries that inspire our community to value our environment. We are committed to increasing our own commitment to protecting our environment. Documentaries are part of our nation's taonga. It is not just telling stories of our history but also capturing our point of view of the world. Our storytelling must be facilitated and protected.

Need for organisation to operate out of premises	<p>We have been sub-leasing offices from Alex Lee Lawyers Ltd. at a discounted rate. The current space at the iconic D72 building on Dominion Road is approximately 180 sqm and we share 45% of the premises. This allows us to provide space for over 20 staff, volunteers and interns working at the offices.</p> <p>The Trust offices are situated in a screen and creative industry precinct where many screen/creative organisations and practitioners are located. The location also provides easy access to community groups</p> <p>The Albert Eden precinct allows us to operate at a lower cost than if we are situated in the city center. It is on the main bus route in and out of the city, the railway line, the airport flyer bus and you can also walk into the city if required. The premises also have visitor car-parking making it easy for visitors to drive to our offices.</p>
Cheaper locations or shared/collaborative spaces	<p>Yes</p> <p>The premises are rented to the Trust at discounted rates and are a shared collaborative environment. The Trust is aware offices must be well-priced. Each year, we explore other options with real estate agents and it is clear that we have appropriate offices. To have a similar/larger space, it will cost more. We must have space that enables us to deliver professional events/outcomes as we are in the world's gaze and welcome a large number of international industry visitors each year.</p>

It is a non-profit public welfare organisation, most of its members are elderly Chinese immigrants. Our activities are fitness, singing, entertainment and so on. These activities are beneficial to the health of the elderly. At the same time, there are lectures to give new immigrants a better understanding of New Zealand's law, education and medical systems. Most of our members come from Mt Albert and Mt Eden areas.
Need for organisation to operate out of premises	If some other associations or organisations invite our association to participate in their activities, we will do it, although not in our region. At the same time, we will visit the elderly and disabled people in rest homes, and perform some singing and dancing,. We often co-operate with libraries in our region and out of our premises to celebrate Chinese traditional festivals.
