Reason for the project	In 2015, we launched Auckland's first Kōanga Festival in 25 years with high success. We identified this need in an Auckland Māori arts hui in 2014 and as a national concern at the National Māori Theatre Hui held in November 2015. There is a lack of Māori Auckland based theatre works presented in our city due to inaccessible costs, a lack of Māori Auckland based theatre infrastructure and few service organisations to facilitate development. We see Kōanga as a development platform for new works and new writers which will engage audiences in the region.		
Community benefit	This project will engage all ages with Māori storytelling through theatre, making this art form accessible and able to be integrated into everyday lives. This festival and its potential growth will contribute to Auckland Councils targets for active participation and employment in the arts by 2040 as it provides an opportunity for work and our practitioners to develop. We expect to see a greater number of mainstage shows presented in Auckland that have developed at Kōanga Festival in the next two years.
