Sadly, the demand for our services continues to increase. Nationwide, the number of people receiving assistance from Victim Support has grown by 13 per cent in the last 18 months alone.

In the year ending 31 March 2017, Victim Support Pukekohe supported 1212 victims. This included 26 victims affected by homicide, 15 by suicide, 133 after a fatal vehicle accident, 26 after the devastation of a rape or sexual assault, and 385 related to family violence.

Changes in government policy and social attitudes mean more people are coming forward and reporting crimes (particularly family violence) to Police, and people are increasingly open to asking for help to confront the impacts of trauma.

Identified community outcomes:

Victim Support is a vitally important community service. We make our communities fairer, more compassionate, and more accessible. We help people to get through the most challenging times of their lives and re-integrate into the community in a way which is healthy for them, their family, and others in their lives and neighbourhoods.

A sudden or unexpected incident can have a significant impact on people's lives, sometimes bringing relationships and careers to a halt. Most people need support after experiencing a serious crime or sudden trauma to help restart their lives. Support needs are not just emotional, but practical and financial as well, including:

- Improved access to our justice system
- Improved access to community services
- Fairer justice services
- Quality rural services
- Keeping victims connected with family, friends, employers, and communities
- Reducing the long-term social impacts of harm
- We are also included in the Civil Defence Emergency Management network as a psychosocial support service

Roofing iron to short in places not enough gutter overhand, water flowing into soffeit..

Though the roof can be temporarily fixed it is recommended long term that the roof be replaced.

We are advised that the current roof is inadequately fastened and could be in danger of coming unfastened in high winds. The church building is in an exposed situation. Should roofing iron come off this would be a serious hazard, with an adjacent main road, primary school not far away and a pre-school a 100 metres from the church.

Identified community outcomes:

The building is grade II heritage listed wooden building,, 150 years old this year, with its 150th celebrations held on the last weekend in July. The new roof will protect the building for years to come. It will also be a safer roof and less liable to damage in high winds, and therefore not a potential danger locally. It will enable the building to continue as a place of worship and community support.

Alignment with local board priorities:

- support initiatives that celebrate our arts, culture and heritage
- support events that celebrate our distinctive local communities and enable people to come together

The roof replacement is a heritage protection project. As explained before St Peter's church is a grade II Heritage listed building, constructed in 1867 and therefore 150 years old this year. The current roof is not fastened adequately, showing signs of leaking, with timber rot as a consequence.

The roof replacement therefore protects this building from the weather and therefore ensures that it will last for many more years yet. It's replacement is a priority for the church Vestry. By protecting the building enables us to implement the second priority
