We already have funding in place to complete the structural aspects of the upgrade and the fit out of the commercial kitchen.</p> <p>We are applying to Waitakere Ranges Local Board for funding for the Cafe Furniture and Equipment.</p>

Promotion:	<p>Not stated We plan to initially hire a cafe manager to market the cafe and commercial kitchen to the community and groups who may wish to run events using our other facilities as well. This will involve networking with groups (such as the Greater Glen Eden Group) as well as overseeing advertising materials and promotional drives. The cafe manager will also manage staff (or volunteer staff) and products to sell.</p>		

Community benefits

Identified need:

We have researched what other facilities are nearby and there are no commercial kitchen facilities to the standard we are creating, available in Glen Eden for general public use, and none with a Community Cafe space attached, meeting rooms and 400 seat auditorium, and 90 car-parks, all in the heart of an already busy community campus.

While there are facilities that meet this need in other suburbs e.g. Henderson has the MPHS Community Trust, there is no facility like this in Glen Eden. The Ceramco Park Function Centre has very limited kitchen facilities, and similarly the Glen Eden Recreation Centre.

This Café is also needed as a place for training people and where people can connect and feel valued.

Identified community outcomes:

At risk and troubled youth attending the VisionWest Training Centre Hospitality Course will gain practical retail experience in the Community Café to assist them to find employment and provide direction and purpose for their lives.

Volunteers at our community café will gain new skills and confidence, assisting them as they seek employment.

Through the ESOL class, new immigrants (who meet in the cafe) would gain confidence in speaking

English and be assisted as they seek to integrate into kiwi culture.

The isolation new parents or any caregivers feel (particularly solo parents) will be addressed by providing a place of support and encouragement at the café coffee playgroup which also has activities for pre-school children.

Opportunity for at risk teenagers to do their community service in the café and connect into our youth programs.

Community groups will not have to travel outside Glen Eden to have access to a multi-purpose facility with a commercial kitchen and cafe space. The hire-age of this facility will be affordable financially to the many community groups that operate off small budgets and rely on fundraising for their ongoing viability.

A local catering facility for community events, conferences, social club events, funerals and weddings.

By upgrading our Community Cafe we are making it a more suitable place for wider community use. Unemployed, unqualified youth will have the opportunity to gain a hospitality qualification in a commercial kitchen and then gain retail experience selling what they created in the café, also youth from the justice system will be able to do their community hours. Caregivers of children will be able to connect at our café coffee group. The cafe will help the community feel connected and valued as it will be open to ESOL classes, social club events, community organisation meetings, weddings, and funerals.

Identified need:

While we were able to prove Maui thermal detection through our previous research in 2016 with the aid of WRLB funding, we identified due to the nature of coast and normal weather conditions that boat access was very restricted and generally unsafe at night. However if we could achieve and prove aerial thermal detection and identification of Maui dolphins we could remove this obstacle and make thermal aerial survey for Maui dolphins both more cost effective and relatively easy. We could then see day and night thermal aerial surveys using plane and drones to deliver Maui thermal surveys to better conserve and protect Maui dolphins, with fishing vessels also using drone systems to reduce the chance of Maui by-catch risk.

Identified community outcomes:

To conserve and maintain a Maui dolphin population along the Waitakere and Auckland West Coast, for the local Waitakere and wider Auckland, New Zealand communities, to maintain their biological natural heritage and preserve the species the global community.
