This project runs with the support of the schools in their own premises. Lifelong physical fitness is an important goal for all students. Yet students with asthma frequently restrict their physical activities. Much of this restriction is unnecessary - children with asthma can and should be physically active. This presents a challenge to classroom teachers, physical education teachers and coaches. This program with school/preschool encourages a partnership among students, families, physicians, and school personnel in managing and controlling asthma so that students can be active. It is the program's hope that this material, "Managing Asthma at School: Making a Difference," will help classroom teachers, physical education teachers, and coaches' help their students participate fully and safely in sports and physical activities.

It is common for athletes to have some breathing difficulties during or after the physical exertion of sports or other athletic events. There are several causes of these symptoms, but poorly managed asthma is the leading reason for this to occur, with up to a quarter of all athletes exhibiting signs of asthma. It is important that athletes are constantly monitoring for early signs of asthma worsening, to allow them to react promptly and maintain control of the condition. Exercise-induced asthma presents shortly after the initiation of intensive physical exercise and involves inflammation and narrowing of the airways. This leads to the presentation of asthma symptoms such as difficulty breathing and wheezing.

To be effective, asthma education needs to be matched to the stage of asthma health literacy of the patient and their whānau. Patients with asthma who are supported by a collaborative Asthma Nurse Educator team do experience better health outcomes. Regular follow-up of all patients with asthma ensures that Māori and Pacific patients are receiving appropriate treatment and that any gaps in care can be rapidly redressed.

Smoking damages the air sacs, airways, and the lining of the lungs. Our Nurse educators remind our community that smoking - and breathing in other people's smoke - makes asthma & COPD worse over the long term by causing permanent damage to the lungs. It can also trigger asthma symptoms or even an asthma flare-up in the short term - 82 per cent of people with asthma tell us that tobacco smoke affects their asthma.
