Concrete, Gravel, Earth will benefit the communities of Westgate, Te Atatu and Henderson by creating opportunities for local people to access high quality arts in their neighbourhoods, through performances taking place in the town centres they frequent. This tactic of localism – locally relevant creative work in familiar places – the works will create access points to the arts for audiences that would not normally engage with contemporary art as well as connect with audience who normally travel for the arts.

Arts led walking is a transformative way of connecting people to creativity and to their local places. In addition to the value that access to arts experiences bring to communities, the arts led walks will give participants ways to create relationships with the built and natural world and helps them form connections to people and history. In our period of significant urban and ecological change people are seeking these connections and wanting to learn how to be kind with each other in public space. Connections to place and people lead to stronger citizen engagement in shaping their local environment.

Healthy Individuals and Whanau

Individuals and their whanau benefit from one-off or short term foodbank support depending on their circumstances alleviating a short term need for food support. Through the winter months in 2019, we have experienced more people struggling to cover their expenses in periods with higher electricity and heating costs. Through the project period of 1 January to 30 April 2020, we expect to see higher volumes of people seeking to reduce their debt following the holiday period as normal seasonal behaviour at that time of year. Those individuals and whanau receiving food parcels are also able to access a range of support services with CARE, including Budgeting, Healthy Meals on Budget Programme, Family Support and Counselling.

Strong and thriving communities

The Te Atatu Community donates the majority of food distributed by the foodbank each year, fostering a sense of connectedness and community in the Peninsula. The foodbank currently has over 20 volunteers who arrange community donations and pack donations into food parcels. The schools, businesses, community groups and individuals contributing to the foodbank as well as it's recipients have a strong feeling of the community supporting one other.

Alignment with local board priorities:

strong community organisations are making a difference

The Te Atatu Community Foodbank (administrated by CARE Waitakere Trust) is a community-led project, supported through donations of food from the Te Atatu and surrounding communities as well as relationships with local businesses, schools and community groups. The project is run by over 20 volunteers and 1 part-time paid staff and the community-led and collaborative nature of the projects creates connectedness within the Te Atatu community.

Recipients of food parcels from the Te Atatu Community Foodbank are also encouraged to access CARE's wrap-around social services including Budgeting and Family Support to help them address the underlying issues for the immediate financial crisis.

Our Clean Plate Less Waste LunchBox Workshops are delivered in collaboration with Love Food Hate Waste and include nutrition information, hands-on recipe demonstrations and how to make lunchboxes nutritious and environmentally-friendly, by reducing shop-bought, packaged food, cooking with leftovers and using reusable containers. We, thereby, hope to encourage the parents, children and the wider community to consider the waste going to landfill and support them to create waste-free lunch boxes. Reducing the amount of packaged foods supplied in lunchboxes will also help improve the nutritional value and, in turn, children's health.

Our workshops are open to everyone in the community and we focus on a “Healthy Eating, Healthy Planet” holistic approach to food, cooking and sustainability - in line with Te Ao Māori. We provide lunchbox guideline resources in a range of languages including Te Reo, Samoan and Mardarin. Our cooking demonstrations are interactive and planned to be delivered to suit a diverse audience. All ingredients and suggestions are considered everyday items in NZ and commonly consumed by everyone. However, when approached by a community/ school with a high representation of a certain group we further tailor the workshop to suit - e.g. bring more translated resources or use certain ingredients we know are popular within that demographic.

Accessible to people with disabilities

Yes - We welcome everyone to our workshops, and make our ideas, suggestions and recipes easy to follow. Because our recipes are geared towards making for or with young children, they are mild, use everyday ingredients and have simple, straightforward methods.

We also make sure the venues hired are accessible to all and make ourselves available to assist anyone who requires extra help or care.

Healthy environment approach:

All our workshops are held in smoke-free venues and are strictly smoke free events as children often attend as well.

Our Clean Plate Less Waste Lunchbox Workshops encourage and support participants to create healthier, waste-free lunchboxes through reducing the amount of shop-bought, industrialised packaged items. We share ideas and suggestions for recipes that are package-free, healthier alternatives to popular lunchbox items. All recipes use every day, budget-friendly and nutrient-dense ingredients. Participants have the opportunity to taste and enjoy the food produced during the workshop and see how easy it is to make tasty/ healthy lunchbox items. We also promote water as the first choice during the workshop and as lunchbox message, e.g. we offer jugs of cooled water with slices of fresh fruit and/ or fresh herbs for participants to drink during the workshop.

Additionally, our workshops are zero waste events - we use only reusable and sustainable materials and promote a zero waste message throughout. Examples of these practices are: we use a worm friendly bin during our cooking sessions, showing participants how easy it is to sort compostable waste during food preparation; any recyclables get sorted accordingly, and

all recipes have a list of variations using different popular leftover or fridge/ freezer items.

As part of our message we reinforce the idea that physical activity goes hand in hand with a wholesome diet to ensure a healthy body and mind.

Community benefits

Identified community outcomes:

For many of the vulnerable young people we work with the first contact point with us is through the Helpline and our volunteer counsellors. Many of the young people are vulnerable – they are disadvantaged, disillusioned and disengaged.

For many we are able to assist them with the issues they present at the time. For others we are able to link them with the help they need. We offer support services to encourage, motivate and inspire them to reach their full potential and create a resilient community.

We aim to equip them with skills and insights on how to build self-esteem and improve mental-health, how to actively problem-solve, recover from setbacks and build resilience. We know that when young people feel connected to their community and valued by others, they gain confidence and self-esteem. This in turn provides them with the strength to make improved decisions, to think about the long term and reduces risk-taking behaviour.

Youthline aims to provide them with skills and strategies to help strengthen and improve the relationships they have with the significant adults they interact with, i.e. parents, whānau and teachers. If we can do this then the community in which they live will benefit.

Alignment with local board priorities:

people know each other and feel connected in their neighbourhoods

Young people in need who contact Youthline through our Helpline often feel lonely, alone, disengaged and desperate. They often have a reduced sense of belonging to family, school or community.

“I felt super alone and I finally found the courage to reach out. When I felt this, only Youthline gave me full support.”

Youthline supports these young people, acknowledges their issues and is inclusive with a strengths-based, person-centred approach.

“The counsellor who talked to me is by far the best person I’ve ever talked to. They have a talent where they know exactly what to say, thank you so much!”

Youthline helpline staff respond to situations of low to high and imminent risk across all mediums of contact, providing a continuum of support and linking service users with other agencies in their own communities. Utilising and promoting Youthline's strengths-based, wrap around approach, Youthline staff are responsible for the quality assessment and management of clients (young people and their families), including those with high and complex needs.

Youthline services equip youth with skills and insights on how to build self-esteem and improve mental-health, how to actively problem-solve, recover from setbacks and build resilience. Counsellors link them with local support services to assist their ongoing development. Through their improved emotional and self-management skills young people are less likely to fall into helplessness, depression, addictive behaviours, dangerous relationships and unemployment.

“The person I spoke to understood me and the things I was worried about, and they were very supportive. I felt like they understood me emotionally and they validated me, and they also told me about other services that I might find useful.”

For many, the Helpline provides a doorway to a range of personal development and life skills programmes offered by Youthline including personal development, job skills (e.g. barista training, CV writing and job applications) and learner licence training. All designed to better equip young people to be active and productive members of their communities.

We know that when young people are engaged in community activities, linked with whanau, and given the opportunity to participate feel that they are part of something and encouraged to reach their potential, that risk taking behaviour is reduced. Youthline works inclusively with youth, from those young people who are most vulnerable to youth leaders who are championing change. Our clinical support workers counsel/mentor young people identified as needing one on one support to encourage and inspire them. They aim to understand the strengths and weaknesses of each young person, then identify goals and milestones and develop a plan for successful implementation and progression. By walking beside a young person and providing positive role models Youthline aims to see every young person become a positive contributor to society with a strong sense of belonging to their local community.

Youthline provides support services to young people in need across the ethnic spectrum. In our last reporting period 16% of calls and texts to our Helpline presented as Maori which is slightly ahead of the 14% of young people aged 15-24 residing in the Auckland area who identify as Maori. For counselling, 10% of young people presenting are Maori which is proportionally low.

All of our staff and volunteers are trained on the Treaty of Waitangi. Maori models of health such as Te Whare Tapa Wha inform our work with target groups of rangatahi Maori. Youthline has a Maori working group (Nga Whetu Poutama) to guide Youthline to increase the organisation's cultural capacity and inform the work that we do.

The name of the project is called Kia Toa. It is designed for survivors of domestic violence a place to go and be part of a journey to healing. Fitness, Boxing and Kickboxing classes are provided for free. The Director has been in the fitness industry for over ten years and is also a survivor of domestic violence. Kia Toa was born out of this.

The Director wanted to use her story to help others and thus far has funded the classes out of her own pocket although she survives on little income. She has paid for all the hireage of the halls as well as the equipment. There is currently nothing in New Zealand which offers this kind of ongoing support. Although it appears at face value that the physical is being attended to, the building of relationships and trust help the survivors to connect and express. This helps them through depression; helps the survivors to sleep and regain an appetite. The group forms a community fellowship that sees the individuals feel supported.

As a survivor herself, the Director has found that the services that are currently available for domestic violence survivors are temporary measures. They tend to be short term eg six weeks. There is also a waiting list that can span months. In addition, services actually close during holiday seasons and domestic violence happens at any time. Kia Toa runs through the holidays and is available long term.

The participants have come through social media via the Kia Toa Facebook page. This has taken them a lot of courage to take that step. None of the participants have a history with each other prior to coming to Kia Toa. However, they themselves have said that coming together via Kia Toa has been so helpful.

The Director originally started from one class and now has grown to four. She is still getting enquiries from further afield. She is currently funding the four classes out of her own pocket and doesn't feel that any survivor should pay for support and healing. They are being held at Sturges West Community House. There are more enquires from Henderson Massey but not enough funding to expand this.

We also educate the parents on the benefits of the natural environment around water and deliver some recommended strategies from the NZ Science Curriculum in context so they can grow with their child's progression. Improving education for Whanau Maori will not only form closer parent and child bonds as they learn about each other through concepts, but also the preventative measures around high risk taking children, and the consequences and benefits around supervision.

We see this is a turning point in the community, it encourages personal strength, it provides access in a holistic sense, and it provides heritage and kaimoana, things that research say attribute to positive change in struggling communities. When communities become mobilised and their time swimming and, in the community, increases as a participating member to that society, a reduction in time spent participating in negative factors such as domestic violence, drugs, alcohol and crime should also be highlighted making 'health and safety' of the community one of the major benefits here.
