**Tukutuku Panels**  
Michelle was invited to attend the unveiling of the Tukutuku panels at the Pumphouse, Takapuna, woven by Ngāti Whatua Weavers. Great to connect with other weavers, and to tautoko such significant work/mahi.

**Paa Harakeke:**  
Michelle (KCFT) has been assisting and supporting at the Paa Harakeke with Kaipatiki Project on an up and coming small event celebration that they are organising. Her role is to maintain the tikanga and integrity of the Kaupapa.  
The Kaipatiki Weaving Roopu are pivotal within the Paa Harakeke, to look after and maintain the Tikanga surrounding the Paa, the plants and the kaitiaki of the Paa.  
The Paa is one of our most significant spaces for the Weavers here in Kaipatiki. The Kaipatiki Weaving roopu takes their role very seriously in terms of helping to look after this space especially the protocols, Tikanga that surround this space. It is not a place that just anyone can go to harvest, as these plants are used and weaved for significant items such as muka korowai, maro, heieke etc.

			<p><b>Weaving Wananga:</b>  The monthly weekend wananga have been going extremely well. The outcome of the workshops for us is to have a lot more people who are willing to help us maintain properly and appropriately our flax plants across Kaipatiki.  We will be holding several clean up days in several of our reserves over the summer months.</p> <p><b>Our Schools:</b>  Michelle has kept in touch with our local schools and noted that now two of our schools in Northcote have Kapahaka tutors - who previously did not. Michelle (KCFT) continues to connect different groups, schools with appropriate people to help support them on a learning journey in Te Ao Maori.</p> <p>Has met with Highbury House to discuss different things that they could look at doing within their community around Te Ao Maori.</p> <p>Meets schools with Laura Martin the journey with our Tamariki and Rangatahi programme of work.</p> <p>Kahui Ako – Birkdale/Beach Haven. This too was great, as it gave those who work in the community (community House managers), a bit of an understanding of Maori Responsiveness and how to build this into their delivery. The disparities between all schools in regard to the mode of transport used to travel to out of school activities, could very well be related to the age differences between the Primary Schools and Intermediate Schools.</p> <p>Bearing in mind that this panel reached Primary School students (Years 4-6) and Intermediate School students (Year 7-8), the level of independence for these age groups is at highly differing levels – this is visible with higher numbers reported amongst Intermediate School students walking to their out of school activities. This panel has produced insightful data which will hopefully instigate discussions both internally and externally to our local schools. The data produced within this report highlights discrepancies between our local schools, however it is important to bear in mind that the teaching style and objectives for each school do differ.


Informed choices are one paramount facet in the arena of empowering youth and promoting ownership over their own learning and pathway. The combination of data suggests that a mean average of 33% of Kaipātiki students felt that their school was not providing them with informed choices about their pathways post schooling.

The data collected within this panel warrants conversations, to ensure that we are in fact providing adequate support for our Kaipātiki students and their own unique pathways post schooling. We have an abundance of resourceful and supportive programmes and services within Kaipātiki whom can aid all three schools to better their statistics in the area of work readiness.

**Children's and Student Panels – Term Four;**

			 <p>All students surveyed displayed a knowledgeable positioning towards commonly promoted components to an environmentally friendly Kaipātiki (clean water, fresh air, nature etc), with students from seven of the schools surveyed identified people as being influential to a good environment.</p> <p>Students from all schools displayed a multifaceted knowledge base in regard to the importance of a good environment. Many students answered that a good environment enhances their sense of safety, their physical health, their mental wellbeing and ensures that the earth is preserved for future generations.</p> <p>An ongoing desire for more community involvement, projects and connection has been a common theme which has arose over the last several panel terms.
