### Summary of Outcomes, Transformational Moves and Access for Everyone

#### Introduction

1. Auckland City Centre Masterplan (CCMP) provides strategic direction for the city centre via ten Outcomes, eight Transformational Moves and Access for Everyone (A4E).
2. Themes emerging from CCMP engagement have shaped the descriptions of this content. The current descriptions are listed in the tables below.

#### Outcomes

3. Outcomes addressing new themes are indicated with green text.

	<b>Outcome</b>	<b>Description</b>
<b>1</b>	<b>Tāmaki Makaurau: Our place in the world</b>	A city centre with a sense of place informed by the past and looking to the future. We want to promote a thriving and authentic Māori identity and culture that is genuinely reflected throughout the city centre.
<b>2</b>	<b>Connected city centre</b>	A city centre that is well-connected to all of Auckland, to the rest of the country and the rest of the world, for the movement of people and goods.
<b>3</b>	<b>Accessible and inclusive city centre</b>	A city centre that is human-scale, inclusive and welcoming to all in Tāmaki Makaurau.
<b>4</b>	<b>Green city centre</b>	New and enhanced green corridors and open spaces, accessible throughout the city centre.
<b>5</b>	<b>Public life</b>	We want to create better public spaces, acknowledging and promoting continued growth in the diversity of public life, to provide an engaging city centre.
<b>6</b>	<b>Residential City Centre Neighbourhoods</b>	Supporting the city centre’s residential neighbourhoods. A safer city centre, with more social infrastructure and greater availability of housing.
<b>7</b>	<b>Quality built form</b>	Delivery of a well-designed and planned city centre by linking the CCMP and Waterfront Plan to Auckland's regulatory planning and design tools.
<b>8</b>	<b>Heritage-defined city centre</b>	A city centre that actively recognises and celebrates Auckland’s historic heritage and special character as a driver of positive change and placemaking.
<b>9</b>	<b>Sustainable city centre</b>	Auckland city centre will address the challenges of global climate change and urban growth via urban design. This part of the CCMP is shaped by targets and direction from Auckland’s Climate Action Framework (ACAF).
<b>10</b>	<b>Prosperous city centre</b>	A city centre that enables business and urban development. An urban environment that is attractive to talent and competitive; delivering a globally competitive quality of life within a flourishing economy.

## Transformational Moves

4. Transformational Moves addressing new themes as a result of engagement are indicated with green text.

	Transformational Moves	Description
1	<b>Māori Outcomes</b>	Anticipates a range of interventions and systemic changes to bring mana whenua presence, Māori identity and life into the city centre and waterfront.
2	<b>The East and West Stitch</b>	This move proposes to improve east-west connectivity in the city centre, enabling high-density land uses in Auckland city centre to expand from the Waihorotiu / Queen Street Valley to the Victoria Quarter and <b>Grafton Gully Boulevard</b> .
3	<b>Waihorotiu Queen Street Valley</b>	This move addresses the growth of Queen Street and the wider Waihorotiu / Queen Street Valley. It proposes to make the area more accessible, more attractive and more prosperous, with pedestrian-friendly streets and better connections to the rest of the city centre.
4	<b>Learning Quarter</b>	<b>This move proposes to improve the physical connections between the universities, the city centre and city fringe and integrate the Learning Quarter into the heart of the city.</b>
5	<b>Rapid Transit-Oriented Development</b>	This move will shape planning and development in the best-connected areas of Auckland, maximising the benefits of investment in public transport, particularly rapid transit and associated public realm.
6	<b>The Green Link</b>	Our vision is to deliver a connected network of green parks and streets across Auckland city centre, running from Quay Park and the Domain in the east through to Victoria Park and Wynyard Quarter in the west. It will transform city centre connectivity and improve access to parks and open spaces.
7	<b>City to the villages</b>	Natural and artificial barriers restrict movement between the city centre and its fringe suburbs. This move will improve the links to neighbourhoods surrounding the city centre.
8	<b>Harbour Edge Stitch</b>	This move incorporates Auckland's Waterfront Plan. It is also consistent with the Ports Master Plan. It will unite the city centre and waterfront through regeneration, public realm improvements and the development of new mixed-use destinations.  Panuku is continuing to work with council this year on an update to the Wynyard Quarter precinct of the Waterfront Plan, based on 2017 council direction.

## Access for Everyone

Access for Everyone (A4E) now states the need to develop the A4E concept into a detailed plan during 2020. This will be led by Auckland Transport. It is likely to require a well-resourced, long-term process for engagement, analysis and design and to ensure that Aucklanders are well informed and engaged. The A4E text also places more emphasis on the use of transition planning to create early wins in support of a longer-term vision for A4E.
