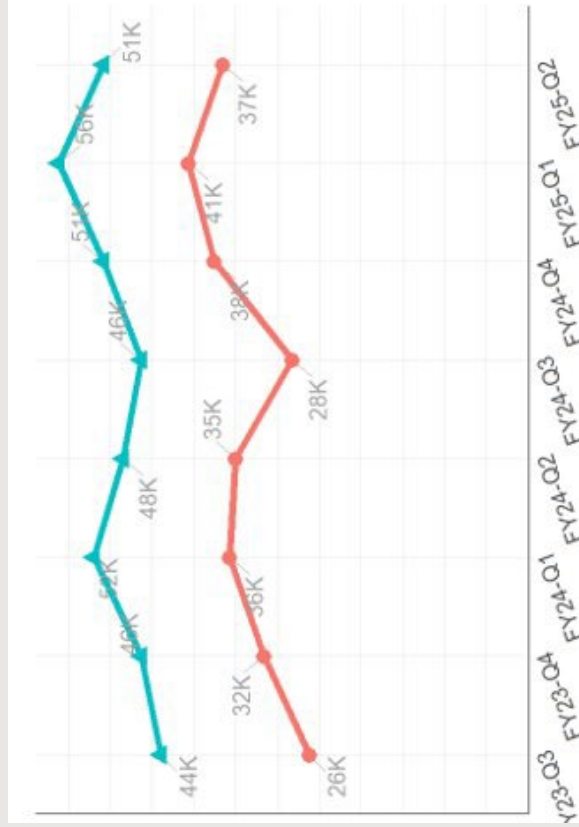

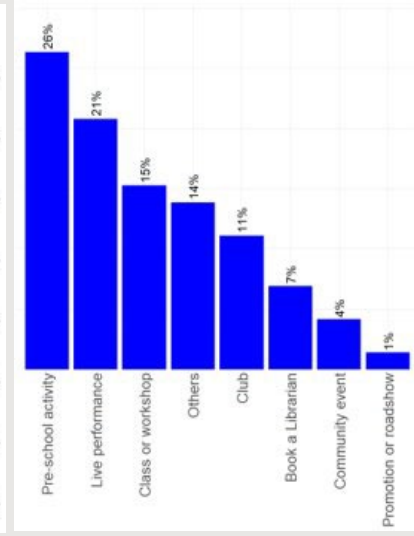
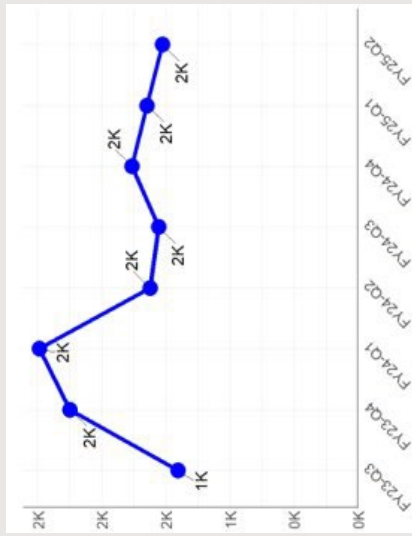
Number of visits and internet sessions (PC and WiFi)



- 31 Skinny Jump sign-ups
- Increase in all areas of service from the same time last year
- Visits totaled 107,000, a 6.43% increase year on year
- 142,000 books issues for the same period, a smaller increase of 3.04%.
- Use of Library internet has increased 9.22% year on year to 77,000 sessions, with use of WiFi (customer using their own devices) 88% of the utilisation



Performance: Mt Roskill Library



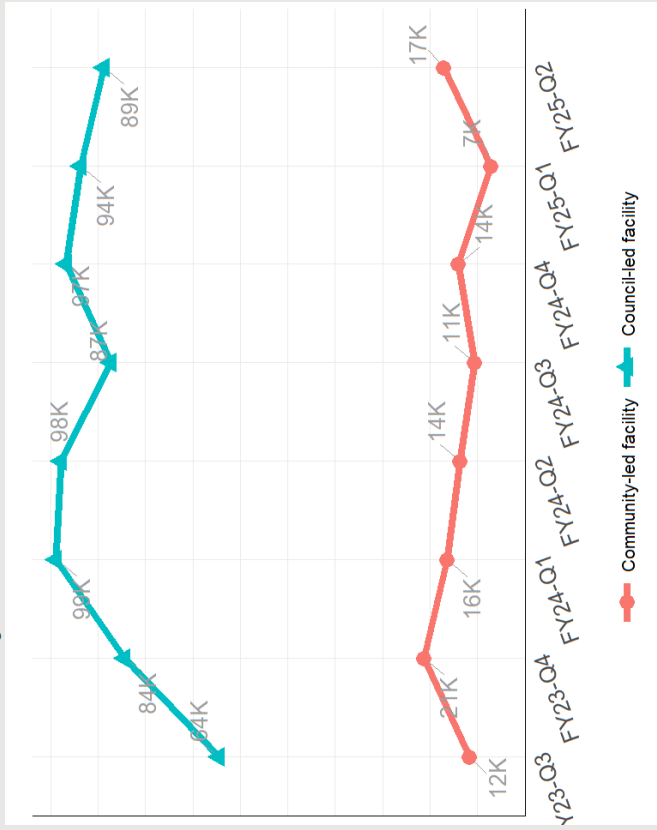
Participants and activity breakdown

- 3523 customers participated in programmes year-to-date
- The preschool weekly programming has been well attended with 540 participants at Wriggle and Rhyme and 187 at Rhymetime in Q2
- The weekly Digital Dropin has been 50 people this quarter
- The Family afternoon games on Sundays have been well attended with 52 adults and 107 children in Q2

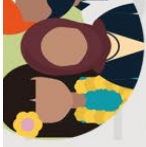
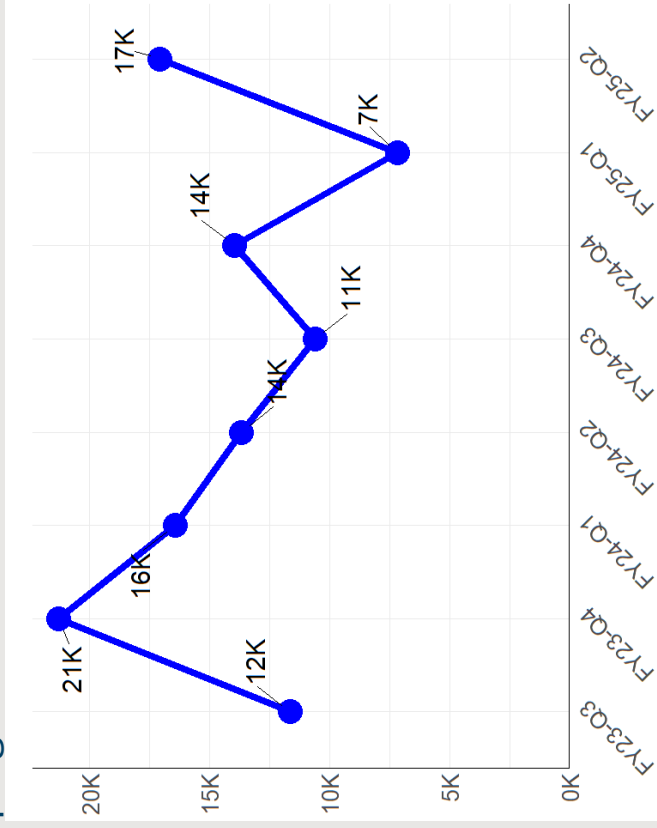


Performance: Participation community and arts venues

Created a safe space for open dialogue and meaningful conversation.



Offered hands-on learning and cross-cultural experiences.

Promoted cultural awareness and understanding.

Planning and mapping

Partnered with the local board community broker to assess neighborhood needs and explore potential partnerships.

Attended Puketāpapa Community Network meetings to gather feedback on safety concerns and preferred ways to stay connected.

Collaborated with groups like Community Patrols New Zealand to discuss strategies for enhancing safety and community connections.



Collaboration

Partnered with Kāinga Ora to provide tenants with access to neighborhood safety resources and support opportunities for community building, focusing on understanding needs and promoting positive integration between new and long-term residents.



Connection and community building

Attended Molly Green Community Day to meet and engage with local residents.

Co-hosted the first Hayr Road gathering, engaging 90 households to strengthen community ties.

Connected with community champions in Lynfield to explore partnership opportunities and ways to encourage involvement

Women's health and wellbeing programme



Zumba sessions have connected women with family links to 27 countries, residing across Puketāpapa Local Board area, strengthening social ties and support networks.



The women-only swimming programme: increased access to services, networking and connection, and building skills, with strong attendance across diverse ethnic and age groups.
